



Visa crackdown

Canada's steep rise in study permit rejections for Indian applicants marks a turning point in what was once a dependable educational partnership. With nearly three out of every four Indian applications now being refused, the numbers alone tell a story of growing caution in Ottawa's immigration policy. The stated reason is fraud prevention. Canadian authorities uncovered widespread misuse of falsified admission letters, many originating from India, and have since strengthened verification processes and financial scrutiny. On the face of it, the government's position is defensible.

No country can afford to compromise the integrity of its education or immigration systems. But the magnitude of the rejection spike, and the resulting drop in Indian enrolments, points to deeper unease within Canada about the reliability of its overseas student intake. For decades. Indian students have been the largest foreign cohort on Canadian campuses, bringing academic talent and significant tuition revenue. Their presence enriched institutions and helped shape a shared reputation for excellence and openness.

That equation is now shifting. Even though there is no clear evidence that genuine applicants are being rejected in large numbers, the overall tenor has changed, from welcoming scrutiny to wary filtering. The larger context is domestic politics. Canada's temporary migration numbers have surged, straining housing, healthcare, and public sentiment. Student visas ~ once a symbol of openness ~ are now a flashpoint in a debate about capacity and control. By reducing approvals, Ottawa is signalling that immigration must align with infrastructure realities.

The shift is not anti-India but anti-overstretch: a correction driven by internal pressures that happen to intersect with the external issue of fraudulent documentation The result is not discrimination but a recalibration of trust driven by administrative necessity and political pressure Canada's visa officers appear determined to err on the side of caution, even at the cost of slower admissions and declining diversity. For Indian applicants, the new reality means meeting higher proof-of-funds requirements and navigating a more sceptical verification system. The danger lies less in bias than in bureaucracy where efficiency replaces empathy and individual merit is lost in procedural caution. The repercussions are already

Prestigious universities report steep falls in Indian enrolment, altering the cultural composition of classrooms that once reflected Canada's global outreach. The broader message, whether intended or not, is that Canada is turning inward, prioritising control over expansion in its international education strategy. Yet, this moment also invites introspection in India. The rise of fraudulent intermediaries has eroded confidence in the credibility of student applications. Unless India strengthens oversight of foreign education agents and tightens its own verification processes, deserving students will continue to be shadowed by the misconduct of a few. In the long run, Canada's caution may protect its system but strain its image. And for India, the lesson is equally clear: credibility abroad begins with accountability at

On 7 November, the lyric that has lodged itself in the political and emotional memory of modern India -Vande Mataram – completed 150 years since its composition. What b e gan as a Sanskritspontaneous, tinged Bengali poem by Chandra Bankim the Chattopadhyay in 1870s grew into a rallying cry for an emerging nation, then into a contested symbol, and finally into the Republic's national song.

To mark this sesquicentennial is to revisit not only the poem's literary origin but also the contested cultural conversations it has carried through generations - about religion and nationhood, about modernity and tradition, and about the languages in which we imagine India. The song first appeared in his celebrated novel "Anandamath" (published in 1882), which vividly captured the anticolonial spirit of the era. Scholars have emphasized how Bankim Chandra's use of Sanskrit elements reaffirmed India's cultural roots. As Dr. R.C. Majumdar noted, "Vande Mataram sounded the clarion call of freedom, echoing the ancient spirit of motherworship and patriotism".

The first two stanzas. constitute National Song today, glorify the Mother land not merely a s a geographical entity but as a divine, nurturing force. Cultural historian and author Dr. Srimati Das, emphasizes the song's transformative role. To her, 'Vande Mataram' was not merely a piece of poetry; it

was a psychological trans-

formation that gave voice to the dormant spirit of nationalism. It provided a spiritual, unifying image of India, making resistance a sacred duty." The song's journey from the pages of a novel to the national stage culminated in the late 19th century. In 1896, during the Calcutta session of the Indian National Congress, it was Rabindranath Tagore - then a relatively young but prominent figure - who first sang 'Vande Mataram' publicly, an early and memorable instance of the poem's migration from

page to public voice.


His rendition set the tune that would resonate for generations, firmly establishing the song's place in the political landscape. 'Vande Mataram' acquired political meaning during the Swadeshi and anti-Partition agitations of the early twentieth century. It began to circulate not merely in books but on platforms, in processions and in the charged atmosphere of Congress sessions. After Tagore's rendition, the poem became part of protest repertoires - sung in meetings, printed on flags, and even proscribed under colonial regulation at moments when its utterance challenged imperial authority. Sri Aurobindo, one of the intellectuals who engaged deeply with the poem, translated 'Vande Mataram' into English. He noted both the lyric's unique poetic force and its mobilising capacity - a 'Vande reminder that Mataram' has been read as devotional metaphor, politi- National Anthem, Jana

In 1937 the Congress adopted the first two stanzas of the poem as its national song, an act that reflected an attempt to retain the lyric's emotive power. Thereafter, the Constituent Assembly adopted Vande Mataram in 1950 as India's National Song - to be honoured alongside

entering the 150th year of the celebration of 'Vande Mataram'," and he reiterated a claim that the song "was composed 150 years ago, and in 1896, Gurudev Rabindranath Tagore sang it for the first time."

He used the occasion to observe that "the national song was composed in Sanskrit," and to lament that "during the period of servitude and also after independence, Sanskrit has consistently suffered from neglect". The Prime Minister, however, noted

his praise over the recent revival of interest in Sanskrit among young people active on social media. That juxtaposition - celebrating a Sanskritised lyric and urging renewed attention to an ancient language is a profound testament to carrying forward a legacy, while not politicizing it. One will agree that pointing to the poem's Sanskritized idiom highlights continuity with India's classical textual traditions.

It also invites reflection on how language is to be treasured, promoted, enriched by useful usage and to be set into a contemporary context, where the young generation is attracted to it - not because of the debate it evokes (read questions), but because of the history and heritage of the language being spoken or discussed. Thus, the language of 'Vande Mataram' connects directly to India's ancient Sanskrit texts, literature, and philosophy. Its style shows how modern works can still carry echoes of classical culture and thought. It also makes us think about how to keep Sanskrit (or any classical language) alive - not as a relic of the past, but as something relevant and useful today. Languages thrive when they are spoken, written, and adapted to new contexts.

The goal is to make young people appreciate Sanskrit not because it is part of a political or ideological argument, but because they feel inspired by its beauty, its role in India's history, and the heritage it

represents Moreover anniversaries are more than exercises in nostalgia The 150th year of 'Vande Mataram' is a moment to take stock - to read the poem closely; to remember its role in anti-colonial mobilization; to acknowledge the causes of debate around its imagery; and to consider the civic practice that accompanies public songs.

'Vande Mataram' has lived through many journeys - from a spontaneous lyrical expression at a Bengali writer's desk to a rousing hymn that stirred anti-colonial crowds; from a symbol of devotion and reverence to a subject of translation, debate, and national ritual. Even today, the song continues to remind us how nations are imagined and expressed, through words that are both personal and collective, poetic and political, classical yet deeply popular. The song is a living testament to the powerful fusion of language, art, and patriotism that catalyzed modern India. Rishi Aurobindo Ghose had poignantly remarked that Vande Mataram is "the mantra that gave us our freedom". The sesquicentennial should be an occasion for both celebration and commemoration of this milestone with honesty and inclusivity. By widening, not narrowing, our civic understanding would be the most fitting tribute to a song that has, for a century and a half, remained one of India's most enduring moral and emotional harmonies.

4,600 crores. With these additions, the total number of manufacturing facilities established under India's Semiconductor Mission has reached 10, with a cumulative investment of a staggering Rs 1.6 lakh crores.

The growth numbers in India's semiconductor landscape tell an inspiring story. From Micron's Rs. 22,516 crore facility in Gujarat to Tata Electronics' massive Rs. 91,000 crore partnership with Taiwan's PSMC, semiconductor India's ecosystem is rapidly taking shape. The latest addition, HCL-Foxconn's Rs. 3,700 crore joint venture in Uttar Pradesh's Jewar, promises to produce 20,000 wafers monthly. These achievements are highly impressive, given India's ambition to capture a market of \$110 billion by 2030, approximately 10 per cent of the global market. While we celebrate these manufacturing milestones, a critical vulnerability remains overlooked: the supply of Rare Earth Elements (REE). Without securing a sustained supply of REE, India's impressive growth in the global chip manufacturing industry could signifi-

cantly derail. Rare Earth Elements, found in the earth's crust, are incredibly essential to produce semiconductors. Most significant of them all is silicon, with China controlling 80 per cent of the raw silicon production in the world. In addition to silicon, other elements such gallium, germanium, dysprosium and terbium are highly essential to prosemiconductors. China controls over 70 per cent of the total rare earth elements combined, making it a near monopoly in the sector. Therefore, India relies heavily on China for Elements to be utilised by the semiconductor industry.

In total, producing one ton of rare earths creates 2,000 tons of toxic waste. Hence, China's dominance in this sector stemmed mainly from its willingness to bear these environmental costs for mineral production. Non-strict environ-



vary quickly and have a significant impact on the industry. Under this light, an alternative for India is domestic extraction of Rare Earth Elements. However, rare earth mining is very harmful to the environment. There are two primary extraction methods for rare earth elements, both of which release toxic chemicals into the environment with devastating conse-

The method involves stripping the topsoil of the land and creating leaching ponds where harsh chemicals separate the valuable metals from the earth. The second method uses PVC pipes and hoses to pump chemicals directly into the ground, creating similar contamination issues and making the environmental cost of REE extraction very significant. According to Harvard International Review, for every ton of rare earth elements produced, mining operations generate 13 kilograms of dust, up to the import of Rare Earth 12,000 cubic meters of toxic gases, 75 cubic meters of contaminated Out of the 2,270 tonnes wastewater, and one ton of of rare earth elements radioactive waste. Most imported by the country in alarming is the presence of

mental regulations and a tolerance for high-pollution extraction methods allowed Chinese companies to undercut competitors and establish market control. The most infamous example is the Bayan-Obo mine, the world's largest REE extraction site, which has created a tailing pond containing over 70,000 tons of thorium. Without proper lining, this toxic sludge is seeping into groundwater at an alarming

Given this information, ly. even though India has identified regional deposits of REE pending extraction, over-reliance on extraction can be dangerous for the environmental resources in the country. To safeguard its semiconductor ambitions, India must adopt a three-pronged strategy. First, diversify sources of Rare Earth Elements by forging strategic, long-term supply agreements with other countries supplying the elements, such as Australia, with a share of around 4 per cent in global rare earth production. Additionally, procurement must be scaled up with countries such as the

United States, Vietnam,

that possess significant REE reserves and are actively looking to counterbalance China's dominance in the market.

Second, is to invest in responsible domestic extraction. India has identified REE deposits in Andhra Pradesh, Kerala. and Tamil Nadu, yet extraction remains minimal due to technical, environmental. and infrastructural challenges. It is essential to establish advanced processing facilities, keeping in mind global best practices for environmental safeguards, and using domestic extraction mainly as a strategic buffer during global supply disruptions, given its adverse environmental impacts.

Third, and perhaps most critically, India must make large-scale REE recycling a national priority. India generates vast amounts of electronic waste annually. much of which contains recoverable quantities of Rare Earths. By establishing an integrated e-waste collection and processing ecosystem, India can reclaim valuable materials while reducing the environmental footprint of mining Technologies for REE recovery from discarded electronics already exist globally, and with targeted investment, India can adapt and scale them domestical-

Recycling offers a circular, sustainable, and geopolitically secure supply, making it a crucial pillar of resilience for building India's semiconductor industry. By blending global sourcing diversification, environmentally sound domestic mining, and robust recycling, India can reduce its overreliance on a supplier and single strengthen its position in the worldwide semiconductor race.
