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## Delhi High Court Instructs Delhi University To Address Appeals Concerning Prime Minister Modi's Degree Details

The Delhi High Court has instructed Delhi University to respond to requests for condoning the delay in filing appeals against a decision related to Prime Minister Narendra Modi's bachelor's degree details. A Bench led by Chief Justice Devendra Kumar Upadhyaya and Justice Tushar Rao Gedela has given the university three weeks to submit its objections.

Four appeals have been lodged against a single judge's ruling that overturned a Central Information Commission (CIC) directive. This directive had ordered the disclosure of PM Modi's degree information. The division Bench is reviewing appeals from RTI activist Neeraj, Aam Aadmi Party leader

Sanjay Singh, and advocate Mohd Irshad.

The Delhi High Court has directed Delhi University to respond to requests for condoning the delay in filing appeals regarding Prime Minister Narendra Modi's bachelor's degree details, with the next hearing scheduled for January 16, 2026, and involving appellants such as Neeraj, Sanjay Singh, and Mohd Irshad.

The court was informed about the delay in filing these appeals, which challenge an August order by a single judge. "Solicitor General of India Tushar Mehta appears for the respondent [Delhi University]. Objection to the applications seeking condonation of delay may be filed within three weeks. Response to the said

objection, if any, be filed by the appellants in two weeks thereafter," stated the

disclosure.

The single judge emphasized that educa-

The matter is scheduled for further hearing on January 16, 2026. The single judge had previously set aside the CIC order, arguing that holding public office does not automatically make all personal information subject to public

tional qualifications are not statutory requirements for holding public office or fulfilling official duties. The judge noted that if educational qualifications were mandatory for eligibility to specific public offices, the situation might differ. The CIC's approach was

described as "thoroughly misconceived."

Following an RTI application by Neeraj, the CIC had permitted inspection of records for all students who passed their BA exams in 1978, including PM Modi. However, the single judge ruled out any "implicit pub-

lic interest" in this information and highlighted that the RTI Act aims to enhance transparency in government operations rather than fuel sensationalism.

University's Position on Disclosure  
Delhi University's coun-

sel sought to overturn the CIC order but expressed no objection to presenting its records before the court. The high court also annulled a CIC order directing CBSE to provide Class 10 and 12 records of former Union Minister Smriti Irani.

This legal battle underscores ongoing debates about privacy and transparency concerning public figures' educational backgrounds. As this case progresses, it will continue to draw attention from various stakeholders interested in governance transparency.

## India Slams Pakistan For Blaming New Delhi For Car Blast In Islamabad

India on Tuesday slammed Pakistan for pointing fingers at New Delhi over the deadly blast in Islamabad which killed at least 12 people.

It comes after Pakistan Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif accused India behind the terrorist attack without giving evidence.

Recent terror attacks in Islamabad, Pakistan, and New Delhi, India, have increased tensions between the two nations, with each accusing the other of involvement; Pakistan blamed India for a suicide bombing, while India linked a Red Fort attack to a Pakistan-based group.

Ministry of External Affairs spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal unequivocally rejected Pakistan's charge as "baseless, unfounded, and a predictable tactic."

Jaiswal stated that the "obviously delirious Pakistani leadership" was attempting to "concoct false narratives against India in order to deflect the attention of its own public from the ongoing military-inspired constitutional subversion and power-grab unfolding within the country." He stressed that the international community would not be misled by

such "desperate diversionary ploys."

Tensions between India and Pakistan have soared following deadly terror attacks in both capitals this week, with each nation firmly accusing the other of involvement.

The diplomatic friction intensified after a suicide bombing in Islamabad, Pakistan, on Tuesday claimed 12 lives. Although the Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) has been linked to the attack, Pakistan Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif immediately sought to shift blame, alleging the perpe-

trators were "Indian-sponsored terrorist proxies."

Patna, November 12: Rashtriya Janata Dal (RJD) leader Tejashwi Yadav has launched a sharp attack on media organisations over the exit polls following the Bihar Assembly elections, alleging that the surveys were conducted "under pressure" and lacked transparency.

Addressing a press conference at his residence in Patna on Wednesday, Yadav questioned the credibility of the polls and accused certain media outlets of being influenced by political powers.

RJD leader Tejashwi Yadav criticized exit polls following the Bihar Assembly elections, alleg-

ing lack of transparency and influence from political powers; he cited high voter turnout, increased by 72

claimed to have captured Islamabad and Karachi. The same media even ran fake news about actor

"These exit polls do not capture the ground reality. The people of Bihar have voted in record numbers to bring change," he said.

Lashing out at the exit polls by the media on the Bihar assembly polls, Samajwadi Party President Akhilesh alleged that they were just conducted to demoralise the Opposition parties and their leaders.

"It is true, and we will have to accept that the BJP is manipulating everything and the exit polls are part of their plan," he charged.

Addressing a press conference after the party's state executive meeting here on Wednesday, Akhilesh Yadav stated that the agencies that conduct the surveys don't disclose their sample size of the exit polls. "They have done the

same thing in the 2024 Lok Sabha elections but the results were opposite of what the polls predicted. It was just an effort to demoralise the Opposition," he added.

Commenting on the ongoing Special Intensive Revision (SIR) in UP, he said, "The Samajwadi Party has made PDA prahari to guard the votes and rights of the people. We have decided not to be scared of SIR."

Calling the SIR a conspiracy of the BJP to scare people so that they can't question BJP, Akhilesh

Yadav said, "The government wants us to be entangled in unnecessary issues while the entire administration is busy making votes for the BJP," he alleged.

"While the BJP people are roaming free, our PDA Prahari will report anomalies and we will report it to the ECI and demand action against officials who are not cooperating," he said.

## Editorial

### Banking stress

Bangladesh's banking system is living through its most severe stress test since independence. The numbers alone tell a grim story ~ nearly a quarter of all loans are in default, billions in assets have turned unrecoverable, and liquidity has thinned despite an official tightening of policy. Yet the problem runs far deeper than the current figures. It is the culmination of a long-standing pattern in which politics, rather than prudence, dictated credit decisions and eroded public confidence in institutions meant to safeguard savings and investments.

The roots of this crisis stretch back decades. For years, powerful business interests and politicians treated commercial banks as private vaults, borrowing large sums against inflated collateral and using political connections to avoid repayment. The result was a slow hollowing out of the financial system, a build-up of bad loans masked by cosmetic accounting and a culture of impunity that rewarded defaulters and punished discipline. Even when the economy was growing rapidly, this rot remained hidden beneath the surface, waiting for a political upheaval or external shock to expose its scale. That reckoning has now arrived. The interim government, led by economists rather than career politicians, has undertaken painful but necessary reforms.

Central bank autonomy, mergers of weak institutions, stricter provisioning norms, and a move towards risk-based supervision represent a belated but credible effort to clean up the system. Transparency has replaced denial, and the exposure of concealed defaults is an essential first step toward rebuilding credibility. However, the task ahead is formidable. Bangladesh is attempting to stabilise an economy amid political uncertainty and declining investor confidence. Inflation has eased but remains high, private credit growth has hit record lows, and the business community is reluctant to expand under volatile conditions. The social cost of austerity ~ slower job creation, weak consumption, and diminished entrepreneurial energy ~ could easily reverse the tentative macroeconomic gains made so far. Foreign investors are watching closely, viewing the clean-up as a test of Bangladesh's institutional maturity. Their confidence will depend not just on numbers, but on consistent policy and credible governance.

The country thus stands on a fragile tightrope. Reforms must continue with consistency and fairness, not with selective enforcement or political bias. For that to happen, political stability and institutional independence are indispensable. Without them, every gain could be temporary, every reform reversible. Bangladesh's experience holds a larger lesson for the region. Financial systems cannot survive when politics routinely intrudes into credit allocation and regulatory oversight. True reform demands not just new laws but a new ethic, one that treats banking as a public trust rather than a political reward. The worst of the crisis may be over, but recovery will be measured not by quarterly indicators, but by whether the next government can resist the temptations that created the crisis in the first place. Stability, like credit, must now be earned ~ through transparency, accountability, and time.

## Theatre of debt

Bihar's economic balance sheet offers a sobering picture of growth without transformation. Behind the electoral fervour and populist promises lies a state struggling to reconcile ambition with capacity, trapped in a fiscal cycle where debt sustains expenditure but rarely builds assets. For every hundred rupees the state produces, nearly forty are owed in debt, a burden that points not just to financial weakness but to structural stagnation. The state's fiscal numbers tell a consistent story of imbalance.

Revenue receipts, dominated by central transfers, far outweigh Bihar's own tax and non-tax revenues, which together account for barely a third of total income. Its fiscal deficit, at more than double the prudential benchmark, and its mounting liabilities underscore how little autonomy Bihar enjoys over its economic destiny. Borrowing is not funding new infrastructure or productive investments; it is paying salaries, pensions, and interest. This is fiscal treadmill economics ~ running fast to stay in



the same place. The deeper concern is that this dependence has become systemic.

Bihar's tax base remains shallow because its economy is predominantly informal, and its industries underdeveloped. The state's revenue model functions more like a conduit for central resources

than as a generator of its own. When the Union's transfers slow or conditions tighten, Bihar's welfare commitments and policy flexibility both shrink. In a federation that rewards fiscal prudence, Bihar is left balancing compliance with survival. This pattern of dependence also carries political implications. Welfare programmes and

## billion-rupee beverage brands over their misuse of the term “ORS

When a Hyderabad-based paediatrician took on billion-rupee beverage brands over their misuse of the term “ORS,” it sounded like a medical dispute. It is much more than that. It is a story about how weak labelling rules and regulatory flip-flops can put lives at risk, and how, in the name of “consumer choice,” companies often mislead rather than empower. Earlier this month, the Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI) issued a decisive order: no food or beverage company may use the term “ORS” in product names, labels, or trademarks, even as a prefix or suffix.

For many doctors who have long fought misleading “hydration” drinks, this was a breakthrough moment. Why it matters is simple. Real ORS, oral rehydration solution, saves lives. It is a precisely balanced mix of glucose and salts recommended by the World Health Organization to treat dehydration, especially in children. But many drinks sold under the “ORS” label in Indian pharmacies and supermarkets contain up to ten times more sugar than the WHO formula.

## Highways can be made safer

India's highways are among the busiest in the world, yet they also rank among the most dangerous. According to “Data for India”, over 150,000 road accident deaths occurred in the country in 2022. However, Sample Registration System (SRS) estimates suggest the actual number may be closer to 270,000. The Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MoRTH) publishes annual reports confirming that national highways and state highways together account for more than 60 per cent of total road fatalities.

The reasons are multifaceted, involving human behaviour, infrastructure shortcomings, and systemic enforcement gaps. One of the primary causes is over-speeding. Highways are designed for faster travel, but in India, speed limits are poorly enforced. Drivers often exceed safe speeds, which is highly dangerous, on stretches with minimal traffic or poor signages. This becomes deadly when combined with sudden curves, potholes, or unexpected obstacles like animals or pedestrians crossing the road. Driver fatigue is another major contributor. Long-haul truck drivers and commercial vehicle operators frequently drive for extended hours without rest, leading to drowsiness and impaired judgment. Many lack formal training in defensive driving or fatigue management, increasing the risk of collisions. Infrastructure deficiencies also play a critical role.

Many highways lack proper lighting, lane markings, and protective barriers. Black spots-areas with a high frequency of accidents ~ are often left undressed. In rural areas, highways double as local roads, with slow-moving vehicles ~ two and three wheelers, tractors, bullock carts, pedestrians and livestock sharing space with speeding cars, buses, and trucks. This mix of traffic types creates unpredictable and hazardous conditions. Enforcement of traffic laws is weak. Highway patrols are sparse, and violations like drunk driving, reckless overtaking, wrong side driving, and driving without seatbelts or helmets or headlights in the night, often go unchecked. Even when laws exist, implementation is inconsistent, corruption rots the enforcing system, and penalties are not always a deterrent. To reduce highway accidents, India needs a comprehensive strategy that integrates engineering, enforcement, education, and emergency response.

First, road engineering must improve. Authorities should identify accident-prone zones and redesign them with better signage, lighting, rumble strips, and pedestrian crossings. Smart traffic management systems using AI and real-time monitoring can help regulate speed and alert drivers to hazards. Second, enforcement must be strengthened. Automated systems like speed cameras and number plate recognition can catch violators without relying solely on human patrols. Increasing the presence of trained highway police and equipping them with modern tools will also help. Every vehicle owner, regardless of type, should maintain a savings bank account with a minimum balance linked to their vehicle registration number. Roadside cameras must capture the registration

numbers of vehicles violating traffic rules, and fines should be automatically deducted from the linked bank accounts.

The license of the driver should be suspended permanently or temporarily and the vehicle seized for repeated offences. Third, driver education is crucial. Licensing reforms should include mandatory training, and skills gradually before receiving full driving privileges. It is designed to reduce accidents, especially among young and inexperienced drivers. Such a system must be



implemented throughout the country, at the earliest. Fourth, the movement of slow-moving vehicles ~ including tractors, bullock carts, bicycles, tippers, and two- and three-wheelers ~ should be prohibited on national highways to ensure smooth and safe traffic flow.

Additionally, both sides of the highway should be fenced to prevent stray animals from entering the roadway and causing accidents. Fifth, vehicle safety standards must be enforced. Mandatory crash testing, and safety features like airbags, ABS, and electronic stability control should be standard. Regular fitness checks for commercial vehicles can prevent mechanical failures on the road. Sixth, emergency response systems need to be robust. The “golden hour” after an accident is critical. Improving ambulance availability, trauma care facilities, and GPS-based emergency helplines can save lives. Finally, public awareness campaigns should promote safe driving habits.

Mass media, schools, and community outreach can help instill a culture of road safety. People who steal from the vehicles involved in an accident must be punished. In summary, reducing highway accidents in India requires systemic reform. Safer roads, stricter enforcement, better-trained drivers, and faster emergency response can collectively make highways safer for everyone. (The writer is a retired

## Participatory Policing

In broad daylight on a busy Hyderabad street in April 2023, a woman was suddenly attacked by a man wielding a knife. Five bystanders, including an auto driver, sprang into action, stopping the assault, tying a cloth around her bleeding neck, and rushing her to a hospital. “We consider it our duty to save a woman from any violence,” they said, their courage earning them recognition and ultimately saving her life.

These bystanders acted because they were there the right place at the right time, witnessing the crisis unfold. But what if the same incident had occurred at night, on a dark street corner, with no one around to hear her cries? How could such heroes know a woman was in danger? This is precisely the promise of the “112 India” initiative, a quietly launched, powerful citizen-centric safety tool under the national Emergency Response Support System (ERSS), rolled out by the Ministry of Home Affairs, with support from the Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC) and the Ministry of Women and Child Development, under the Nirbhaya Fund. The National Annual Report & Index on Women's Safety (NARI 2025), drawing on the experiences of over 12,400 women across 31 cities, reveals that 35.4 per cent of women feel unsafe in public spaces, and out of every 100 incidents of harassment, only 16 reach women's helplines.

This gap reflects low awareness and limited trust in existing support systems. 112 India has the potential to close this divide ~ making emergency help simpler, and importantly, community-backed, offering a trusted lifeline. 112 India unifies police, fire, ambulance, disaster response, and helplines for women and children under a single number: 112, India's own 911. This integration eliminates the confusion of multiple helpline numbers like 100, 101, 108, 181, and others. As of March 2025, ERSS-112 reportedly handled 1.2 million calls per hour. ERSS-112 is deployed as a State-centric system, receiving distress calls from citizens over 10 different channels (Voice Call, SMS, SOS, Email, Web Request, conversational AI Chatbot, Media

Crawler, IoT-based Signals, WhatsApp and External Signals), on a common platform setup in the ‘Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP)’ of the States. Calls from citizens on the ‘Call-Taking System’ are forwarded with complete incident data for further action.

Emergency Response Units (vehicles) are equipped with Mobile Data Terminals, enabling real-time tracking and communication. The panic button and Global Positioning System facility in all mobile phone handsets. Rules, 2016 mandate “panic button” functionality for mobile handsets sold in India. On a smartphone, pressing the power button three times quickly activates a panic call. On a feature phone, long pressing the 5 or 9 key does the same. Innovation lies in two unique features on the 112 India App, available on both Google Play Store and Apple App Stores: “Volunteer” and “Shout.” The Volunteer option allows common persons to register as active volunteers by uploading a KYC document, to be verified by the local police before approval. This ensures responsible and trusted volunteers. The ‘SHOUT’ feature is designed for women and children in distress.

When activated, “SHOUT” sends a quick alert to nearby volunteers

and pre-selected contacts along with the police. This alert provides the victim's precise location, allowing willing volunteers to quickly reach the scene and provide a vital presence. Integrating technology with community action, 112

reportedly planning an AI-powered voice assistant in its 112 helpline to allow callers to communicate in over 15 Indian and foreign languages, including Bengali, Manipuri, Spanish, and Arabic. This innovation ensures that even tourists, students, and migrant workers can seek help instantly in their own language. Globally, the need for a single and simple emergency number was felt after the Kitty Genovese tragedy in New York City in 1964. About 37 neighbours heard Kitty's cries during her murder but none called police ~ highlighting apathy, and the absence of an easy way to call help. The case is thought to be one of the reasons for the 911 emergency call system that the United States has been using since 1968.

It is based on the idea that simplifying the call for help could overcome bystander hesitation. Over time, 911 became part of the American culture: schoolchildren are taught how to dial 911, media reported stories of kids saving parents with quick calls. When a child's failed attempt to save her mother by dialling 911 from a hotel phone that required dialling ‘9’ for an outside line, Karl's Law (2018) mandated direct 911 dialling from all multi-line systems without the need for any prefix. Across the European Union, ‘112’ has become the universal standard under Directive 2002/22/EC.

Russia and South Africa also use it as primary emergency number. Due to global mobile interoperability, even in countries like the USA, dialling 112 connects directly to local emergency lines. Apps like PulsePoint in the US and GoodSAM in the UK mobilize off-duty professionals like doctors as first responders. 112 India goes further: it empowers every responsible citizen. It is now the moral responsibility of every capable citizen to register as a volunteer. Schools, colleges, workplaces, and community groups should spread awareness. Just as blood donation became a civic duty, so too should “safety volunteering.”



## Prashant Kishor Fails to Impress In Bihar? Exit Polls Show Jan Suraaaj May Barely Open Account

(Gns). Exit poll results have dimmed the prospects for Prashant Kishor's Jan Suraaaj Party, which had hoped to make an impact in its first election. The predictions on Tuesday indicated a decisive win for the NDA in Bihar, disappointing the Tejashwi-led opposition Mahagathbandhan. Post-poll surveys suggest a clear majority for Nitish Kumar's ruling coalition, while Tejashwi Yadav's alliance is expected to fall short of the required numbers in this tightly contested election.

Exit polls predict a significant setback for Prashant Kishor's Jan Suraaaj Party in Bihar, with forecasts of fewer than five seats, and indicate a victory for the NDA. These predictions also suggest that Nitish Kumar's coalition will likely retain power, while Tejashwi Yadav's alliance is

Suraaaj Party, which aimed to establish itself as a significant player, faces a major setback according to these predictions. poll has estimated that Jan Suraaaj might win between 0-5 seats. Similarly, People's Insight predicts 0-2 seats for the party. Matrizze also forecasts 0-2 seats, while JVC suggests a maximum of one seat, and Dainik Bhaskar anticipates up to three seats for Jan Suraaaj.

Despite these unfavourable predictions

for Jan Suraaaj, the broader picture shows a strong performance by Nitish Kumar's camp. The ruling coalition appears poised to maintain its hold on power in Bihar. Meanwhile, Tejashwi Yadav's alliance seems unlikely to reach the necessary majority.

The exit polls have not only been disappointing for Prashant Kishor but also for the entire opposition bloc led by Tejashwi Yadav. As results unfold, it remains to be seen how accurate these predictions are and what they mean for Bihar's political landscape.

Prashant Kishor was seen casting his vote during the second and final phase of the Bihar Assembly elections in Rohtas. His party had entered the electoral fray with hopes of carving out a niche in state politics dominated by established players.

## UP: Farmer killed by tiger in Pilibhit; boy attacked by wolf in Bahriach

(Gns). A tragic incident occurred in Pilibhit district when a tiger attacked and killed a farmer guarding his field.

The victim, identified as 47-year-old Chhote Lal from Navdiya village under the Puranpur police station area, was dragged into the nearby forest by the tiger. His partially eaten body was discovered on Wednesday morning.

According to reports, Chhote Lal had gone to his fields on Tuesday morning to guard his crops but did not return home till dinner, as he usually did. When family members went to check on him early Wednesday, they could not locate him. Fearing a tiger attack, villagers armed with

sticks and rods began a search operation. About 100 meters inside the forest, they discovered parts of his body; the lower portion and one arm were missing, apparently devoured by the tiger.

Forest officials recovered the remaining body parts within a 200-meter radius and sent them for post-mortem examination. The Forest Department has launched a search for the tiger and set up several trap cameras in the area.

Villagers reported that this was the third tiger attack in the past month in the region spanning Patabhoji, Navdiya, and Hardoi Kala villages.

Locals allege that despite repeated complaints, the Forest Department failed to increase patrolling or install



cages to capture the tiger.

"Going to the fields at night has become like inviting death," said village elder Harinarayan. "We have requested the Forest Department several times to take action, but nothing has been done."

Forest officers and local

police reached the spot after the incident. Pugmarks and drag marks were found near the scene. Officials believe the tiger might have strayed from the Barahi Range of the Tiger Reserve.

The Forest Department has deployed tracking teams and appealed to villagers not to go alone into the fields, especially at night. The process to provide compensation to the victim's family has also been initiated.

Meanwhile, a report from Bahriach said that an 8-year-old boy was critically injured when a wolf attacked him in Gangapur village under the Hardi police station area on Tuesday evening.

## ‘Education makes them more dangerous’: Assam CM on Red Fort blast

(Gns). In an apparent reference to the arrest of several doctors, who were allegedly part of the Jaish-e-Mohammed module busted in Faridabad and linked to the Red Fort blast, Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sharma on Wednesday said a person never changes his colours and education makes them more dangerous.

"We were taught that if people are educated, there will be no extremism anymore. But you saw that education makes them more dangerous. Becoming a doctor makes them even more dangerous. A person never changes his colours," Himanta told reporters in Guwahati while

speaking on the Red Fort blast. He asserted that those who cannot sing

intentions are malicious. If such people are educated, they will still do bad deeds.



Vande Mataram cannot be Indians. "If you cannot be an Indian, you can never consider Bharat Mata your Maa."

Without directly referring to any particular community, Sarma said if one is educated, they will make even more bombs if their

"Being educated doesn't guarantee good deeds."

He also claimed that one of the arrested doctors was involved in 'Love Jihad'. "When he was studying in college, he used to get Hindu women lured by and marry Muslim men, and get converted,"

he alleged.

He further added: "So, we have to be alert. If we relax, only then does something end up happening. We need to learn from Pahalgam and Delhi."

At least 13 people were killed and over 20 others injured after a powerful explosion ripped through a Hyundai i20 car near Red Fort in Delhi on Monday.

A Pulwama doctor named Umar Un Nabi is the prime suspect of the blast. According to initial findings, He was behind the wheel of the i20 car that blew up. Investigation also linked him to the "white collar" Jaish-e-Mohammed terror module busted by Jammu and Kashmir Police hours before the blast.

## Poll Diary Forecast Big Margin In Bihar: NDA Set for Landslide Win with 184-209 Seats, MGB Struggles

(Gns). The Poll Diary Exit Poll 2025 paints a decisive picture for the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) in the Bihar Assembly Elections, predicting a landslide victory that could reshape the state's political landscape.

According to the projections, the NDA is expected to secure between 184 and 209 seats, a commanding lead that places it well above the majority mark of 122 in the 243-member Assembly. In contrast, the Mahagathbandhan (MGB) is likely to manage only 32 to 49 seats, signaling a steep decline from its previous performance. Smaller parties and independents are projected to win between 1 and 5 seats.

The Poll Diary Exit Poll 2025 forecasts a significant

victory for the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) in the Bihar Assembly Elections, expecting them to win between 184 and 209 seats, while the



Mahagathbandhan (MGB) is projected to secure 32 to 49 seats; counting is scheduled for November 14.

If these numbers hold, the result would mark one

of the strongest mandates for the NDA in recent years. The alliance's focus on governance, infrastructure expansion, and welfare schemes appears to have



resonated strongly with voters across urban and rural Bihar.

MGB Struggles to Regain Lost Ground The RJD-led Mahagathbandhan seems

to have failed to consolidate its core support base, especially among younger and first-time voters. Analysts suggest that fragmented messaging and internal rifts may have weakened its campaign momentum in key constituencies.

Minor parties and independents continue to play a limited role, collectively expected to secure less than five seats - a sign that Bihar's electoral fight remains largely bipolar.

With counting set for November 14, all eyes are now on whether the exit poll predictions translate into actual results. If the Poll Diary numbers prove accurate, Bihar may witness the return of a strong NDA government with a comfortable majority.ku

## World moving towards multipolarity, India emerging as a major power: Army Chief

(Gns). Army Chief General Upendra Dwivedi has observed that the world is undergoing a major geopolitical shift from a unipolar to a multipolar order, asserting that India is poised to emerge as one of its key power centres.

Speaking on the concluding day of the Delhi Defence Dialogue, here on Wednesday, the Army chief said that we are also in an era where several disruptive technologies have emerged which are having a disproportionate effect on military capabilities.

"We are also in an era where technological changes are so rapid that if you do not keep pace you are going to be outdated by the time you decide and develop. So, if we have to meet these emerging challenges, we have to look at different models or a model which is different from what we were employing," he said.

The COAS further highlighted the three "Ds" transforming warfare- democratisation, diffusion, and demography. "I'll give out three Ds, which are chang-

ing the war scenario today. Democratisation, that is the newest technology, and it

has already been shown that the platform alone is not relevant. It has to have a number of layers supported by this democratised phenomenon that is AI, quantum,

robotics, auto system. DW that is energy weapons, cyber tools, especially in the grey zone. Diffuse geographic independence, but dependent.

And Demography, you have Citizen soldiers, guardian forces, and even merchants now play roles in conflicts, sometimes selling equipment to both sides," he said.

He stressed that India's air defence strategy must evolve beyond conventional reliance on fighter aircraft and missiles. "The frontlines are no longer straight lines; threats now emerge from every direction and altitude," he cautioned. Drawing insights

from recent global conflicts, he underscored the need to develop advanced systems

capable of detecting, disrupting, and neutralising drone swarms before they can cause damage. With India accelerating investments in indigenous

drone and counter-drone technologies, General Dwivedi underlined a clear objective: India must take the lead in shaping the next era of network-centric warfare.

Speaking on India's own strategic priorities, he reiterated that geography continues to shape the nation's defence posture. "Given the nature of our borders, land will always remain the ultimate determinant of victory," he said, adding that even major global powers recognise the enduring importance of territorial control in modern conflict.

Stating that the India Army is looking at human-centric technology and is



also considering generation-7 technology, the army chief said, "Industry 4.0 has moved to Industry 5.0... 4.0 was when AI, quantum and all this were talked about. But 5.0 has realised that the rebalancing is required to bring in the human element. Technology is there not to replace humans, but to support them... Now, why is it important for us, especially for the Indian army... This industry, 5.0, is music to my ears because we are looking at human-centric technology adoption. We look at humans amplified by AI. The creativity, the empathy factor, problem solving, and turning data into decisions must remain in control of human beings."

"There is another thing called technology generation-7. The 7.0 technology is the new mobiles and computers of that generation, video game consoles and 7 nanomillion technology for microchip. All these combined together and on the table for me to integrate, interpret and thereafter make sure that the Indian Army gets to gain from it," General Dwivedi added.

## EAM Jaishankar holds bilateral talks with global counterparts in Niagara, discusses trade, strategic ties

(Gns). External Affairs Minister (EAM) S Jaishankar has held a series of bilateral meetings with his counterparts from Canada, Germany, South Africa, Mexico, France, and Brazil, and the premier of the Canadian province of Saskatchewan on the sidelines of the G7 Foreign Ministers' Meeting in Niagara.

During the meetings, he reviewed the strategic partnerships with them and also discussed ways to deepen ties across various sectors, including trade and technology.

Jaishankar on Tuesday met with his Canadian counterpart, Anita Anand, and discussed the ongoing progress in bilateral cooperation under the India-Canada Roadmap 2025.

In a post on X, Jaishankar expressed his pleasure at meeting Anand and acknowledged Canada's role in hosting the G7 Foreign Ministers' Meeting. Appreciated the progress in

the implementation of the New Roadmap 2025. Look



forward to the further rebuilding of our bilateral partnership," Jaishankar said.

Last month, following a meeting between Jaishankar and Anand during her official visit to India, both leaders reached a consensus on a New Roadmap for India-Canada relations, based on mutual respect for shared democratic values, the rule of law, and a commitment to upholding the principles of sovereignty and territorial integrity, as per a statement by the Ministry of External Affairs.

The meeting with Anand in Canada comes amid Jaishankar's series of diplomatic engagements in Canada with his counterparts from South Africa,

Mexico, France, Germany, and Brazil, as well as the



Premier of Saskatchewan Province, Scott Moe, to strengthen cooperation across multiple sectors.

Earlier, Jaishankar met South African Foreign Minister Ronald Lamola and Mexican Foreign Minister Juan Ramon de la Fuente.

With de la Fuente, the EAM focused on expanding collaboration in trade, health, pharmaceuticals, and science and technology.

He also met Premier Scott Moe of Saskatchewan, with talks centered on deepening cooperation in energy, food, and fertilisers.

"A pleasure to meet FM Dr Juan Ramon de la Fuente of Mexico. Discussed further advanc-

ing our cooperation across business, trade, health & pharmaceuticals, and science & technology," Jaishankar stated in a post on X.

"Good to meet again with the Premier of Saskatchewan Province, Scott Moe. Discussed opportunities to enhance cooperation in energy, food and fertiliser. Value his warm sentiments towards our relationship," the EAM said in another post.

In other bilateral engagements, Jaishankar held discussions with German Foreign Minister Johann Wadehul, focusing on advancing the India-Germany strategic partnership and India-EU ties, and exchanged views on developments in West Asia, Afghanistan, and the Indo-Pacific.

He also met with French Foreign Minister Jean-Noël Barrot, during which both sides reviewed their strategic partnership and discussed cooperation in multilateral and plurilateral platforms. His meeting with Brazilian Foreign Minister Mauro Vieira explored ways to enhance cooperation in trade, investment, health, and technology.
