

## We must free ourselves from every trace of colonial mindset: PM Modi

(Gns). Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday asserted that India is becoming the key growth engine of the global economy, adding that in an atmosphere of geopolitical uncertainty, the country is emerging in a league of its own and moving ahead with deep self-confidence.

"In a world of slowdown, mistrust and fragmentation, India brings growth, trust and acts as a bridge-builder," PM Modi said while addressing a media summit here.

He further said that every sector today is shedding the old colonial mindset and aiming for new achievements with pride.

"You know very well that no nation can move forward without self-confi-

dence. Unfortunately, long years of colonial rule shook this very confidence in India. The reason for this was a deep colonial mindset. This colonial mentality has become a major barrier in achieving the goals of a developed Bharat. That is why today's Bharat is working to free itself from this mindset," the Prime Minister said.

"I am requesting the people of our nation to look at the coming ten years as a clear time frame. I cannot achieve this without your support. The policy of Macaulay that sowed the seeds of mental slavery in Bharat (India) will complete two hundred years in 2035," the Prime Minister said.

"This is why, within these ten years, we must free ourselves from every trace

of that colonial mindset," PM Modi said.

He said the transformation taking place in India is not merely about possibilities. It is the real story of changing lives, evolving mindsets and a nation moving in a new direction, he said.

PM Modi also mentioned India's Q2 GDP growth of 8.2 per cent and said India is emerging as a pillar of trust.

"When the world speaks of slowdown, India continues to write a story of growth. When the world faces a crisis of trust, India is emerging as a pillar of trust. When the world moves

towards fragmentation, India is becoming a bridge builder," PM Modi said.

"The second quarter GDP figures for India show

These are not just numbers. They are strong macroeco-

key growth driver of the global economy today," he said.

"Today we stand at a moment when one fourth of the twenty-first century has already passed. In these twenty-five years, the world has witnessed many ups and downs. It has seen financial crises. It has faced a global pandemic. Each of these situations has challenged the global community in some form. Amid an atmosphere of uncertainty, our nation is emerging in a league of its own. India is moving ahead with deep self-confidence," he said.

Reforms carried out

in India earlier were "reactionary", but they are guid-


"vast and previously unrealised potential".

"A large part of India's potential remained untapped for a very long time. When this untapped potential receives greater opportunities, and when people contribute to national development with full energy and without barriers, the nation's transformation becomes certain. Our Northeast, our villages, our tier two and tier three cities all hold immense potential that could not be utilised in earlier decades. India is now moving forward by tapping this vast and previously unrealised potential," PM Modi said.

The Prime Minister further said that the transformation of the nation becomes certain when its people contribute to development without barriers.

## Uddhav Thackeray lambasts Fadnavis for not appointing Leader Of Opposition

(Gns). Shiv Sena chief Uddhav Thackeray targeted the BJP-led Fadnavis government on Saturday, demanding that if the post of Leader of Opposition is not appointed in both the legislative assembly as well as the legislative council, the post of Deputy Chief Minister should be cancelled immediately.

Thackeray questioned why the Fadnavis government is afraid to give the post of Leader of Opposition to both the houses, namely the legislative assembly as well as the legislative council.

"We had demanded during the very first session of

this government that they should give him the post of Leader of the Opposition. Now a year has passed, but this government has done nothing except make announcements.

"For the first time in the history of the legislature, there is no Leader of the Opposition in both the houses. This government is strong and it is supported by the central government. Despite this, why is this government afraid to appoint the Leader of the Opposition?" Uddhav

Thackeray questioned.

"They have many corrupt people with them by covering up all their follies. Despite doing all this, why is this government afraid of the post of Leader of the Opposition? This government should immediately announce the Leader of the Opposition for both the Houses.

Also, if you are going to cite the law, then the post of Deputy Chief Minister should be abolished immediately, because there is no provision for such a post anywhere in the Constitution.

"If some portfolios have to be given, then give that to him (Eknath Shinde) but do not call him Deputy Chief Minister. This government should announce the post of Leader of the Opposition in both the houses during the forthcoming winter session. This is our demand," Uddhav Thackeray told media persons here on Saturday.

"These days, the Chief Minister gives only twisted answers. He cannot give a straight answer. Farmers have experienced the crisis of heavy rainfall in Maharashtra since September and it should have been declared a disaster.

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said the rupee should be allowed to "find its own level", as questions grew over the currency's slide against the US dollar. Speaking at the Hindustan Times Leadership Summit (HTLS) 2025, Sitharaman was asked if the rupee was now "a little too high" against the American currency.

The Finance Minister avoided giving a specific

target for the exchange rate, but linked the current level to wider global moves. The rupee had hit a fresh record low of 90.43 against the dollar on Wednesday, December 3, before recovering on Thursday and closing at 89.89, gaining 26 paise.

Finance Minister

Nirmala Sitharaman stated the rupee should find its own level during the Hindustan Times Leadership Summit (HTLS) 2025, avoiding a specific exchange rate target and linking the current level to global moves; the rupee hit a record low of 90.43 against the dollar on

December 3. Rupee and currency policies

Nirmala Sitharaman accepted that the Bharatiya Janata Party had earlier attacked a falling rupee while in Opposition, but stressed that the background at that time was not the same as the current situation.

Responding to this political context, Nirmala Sitharaman noted how sensitive exchange rate commentary can be.

Goyal highlighted the wide range of opportunities offered to students and lauded the university's commitment to merit through scholarships that enable need-blind admissions.

He expressed satisfac-

tion that half the student population comprises young women and praised the university's strong innovation culture, with over 450 patents held by students. He also took note of the fact that 50 faculty members are Ramalingam Swami Fellows who have returned to serve the nation.

Recalling Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar's legacy on Mahaparinirvan Diwas, the Minister reiterated the constitutional values of equality, social harmony,

The Minister described the graduating cohort as an important part of India's journey towards a developed nation by 2047, noting that the next 25 years will be the defining era for Viksit Bharat. He urged students to take their chosen fields to the next level, push boundaries, and contribute meaningfully to national progress.

Goyal highlighted that Prime Minister Narendra Modi, in his address from the ramparts of the Red Fort, had appealed to one lakh young men and women to consider public life and politics as a vocation.

Posting on his social media account on Saturday, Mr. Yadav said there should be no debate or dispute over the Constitution.

"On this one issue, everyone should stand together. The Constitution is not just a book; it is the

very foundation of our nation," he emphasized.

Mr. Yadav said the saddest situation for a democracy is when Parliament has to debate on saving the Constitution, whereas the Constitution actually mandates discussions on taking

the country forward. "A crisis for the Constitution is essentially a crisis for democracy," he said.

He added that those who wish to weaken the Constitution also wish to weaken democracy.

## Editorial

### Contrasting Trends

Israel's announcement that the Rafah crossing will soon reopen for Palestinians seeking to leave Gaza has been framed as a gesture of support for the ongoing ceasefire. But the flurry of conflicting statements that followed tells a more complicated story ~ one in which humanitarian relief is still mediated through layers of strategic calculation, political theatre, and unresolved hostility. On paper, the plan appears orderly: exits through Rafah would resume under a mechanism involving Israeli security approval, Egyptian participation and supervision by a European mission.

In practice, even this limited arrangement immediately met with resistance. Cairo has publicly rejected any suggestion that it is coordinating with Israel. Its insistence that the crossing can operate only in accordance with the US-backed plan, and in both directions, is not merely a diplomatic clarification; it signals Egypt's determination to avoid any perception of acquiescence to Israeli control over Gaza's borders. This discord reveals how even the smallest movement at Rafah reflects much broader power dynamics. For Israel, reopening the border is tied to ceasefire compliance and the delicate hostage-return process. For Egypt, it is about asserting sovereignty and distancing itself from policies that could provoke domestic criticism or undermine long-standing regional positions. For Palestinians, it is simply about survival.

The scale of need is staggering. Tens of thousands of severely ill and wounded Palestinians are waiting for evacuation, while only a few hundred have been permitted to leave since the ceasefire began. The reopening of Rafah, even if temporary and heavily controlled, offers a narrow passage for those whose lives now depend on access to hospitals abroad. Every delay is measured in lives lost, not diplomatic talking points. Yet, the humanitarian narrative cannot be separated from the political one. Reports that Palestinian Authority (PA) personnel may assist at the crossing, but without displaying official insignia, demonstrate the convoluted compromises that define Gaza's governance vacuum. Israel's refusal to allow any formal PA role, while simultaneously relying on its quiet involvement, encapsulates the contradictions of post-war planning.

These arrangements are not steps toward a coherent political order; they are improvised fixes designed to function only for as long as the ceasefire holds. At the same time, Israel's hesitation to reopen Rafah until all deceased hostages are returned underscores how intertwined humanitarian access has become with the bargaining logic of the conflict. The partial retrieval of remains, ongoing disputes over identification and continued negotiations illustrate that even the dead have become part of the political ledger. In this context, the reopening of Rafah is not a diplomatic breakthrough but a reminder of how provisional the current calm remains. The crossing may soon open, but the deeper questions of authority, accountability and post-war governance remain unanswered. For those trapped inside Gaza, a functioning border is essential. But it cannot substitute for a political framework capable of ensuring that such openings are not forever conditional.

## Blaming the system for rejection by the people

Indian democracy is a reflection of the world's largest public will. Here, elections are not just confined to change of power, but a sacred national ritual – where every vote serves as the pulsation of a healthy democratic system. Therefore, the accuracy of the electoral rolls is not only an administrative work of the Election Commission of India (ECI), but also a question of protecting the constitutional spirit of India.

With this basic spirit, the Election Commission launched a massive campaign of 'Special Intensive Revision' (SIR) of the electoral rolls from July 1 this year, so that no ineligible person (including infiltrators) is included in the rolls and no eligible citizen is left out. After Bihar, the process is underway in 12 more states. The previous SIR was conducted in the country during 2002-04.

It is ironic that those political parties and their top leaders who were trying to project themselves as the 'protectors' of the Constitution by waving copies of it, are now raising baseless questions on this statutory electoral reform process inside and outside the Parliament. Several petitions have been filed in the Supreme Court against the nationwide SIR by opponents, including opposition parties as well as self-proclaimed "protectors of the Constitution and democracy".

Former Union Minister Kapil Sibal and Congress MP Abhishek Manu Singhvi are representing them as senior advocates.

The Congress has unsuccessfully tried to blame 'vote chor' for its debacles in last year's Haryana and Maharashtra elections and recently concluded Bihar elections. Of the 61 seats it contested in Bihar, Congress bagged only six receiving just 8.7 per cent votes. It should be remembered that Congress's vote share drastically dropped to 6 per cent in 2005, that too when the UPA government was at the helm. Will the Congress be able to explain who committed the 'vote chor' then? Congress' performance has been steadily declining for the past three

decades in Bihar. In the 1990 assembly elections, it received approximately 24.7 per cent votes, which dropped to 16.2 per cent in 1995, 11 per cent in 2000, a meagre 8.3 per cent when

21 per cent in 2009 to a mere 12 per cent in 2024. Will this steady erosion – or in the words of the Congress leadership, 'match-fixing' and 'vote chor' – also be blamed on



contesting alone in 2010, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and the ECI? The last 6.7 per cent in 2015, and 9.48 per cent in 2020. This decline of the Congress is not just confined to Bihar.

After independence, the Congress ruled the country, directly or indirectly, for 50 years. During this period, Congress lost power in Tamil Nadu (1967), West Bengal (1977), Uttar Pradesh (1989), Gujarat (1990), Maharashtra (1995), Odisha (2000), Goa (2012), and Delhi (2013) and has not been able to return to power on its own. In Delhi, it even failed to open its account in the 2015, 2020 and 2025 elections. Its vote share in the Maharashtra assembly elections has dropped from

21 per cent to a mere 12 per cent in 2024. The party, under the leadership of Prime Minister Modi, fought the 2024 Lok Sabha elections amid anti-incumbency, opposition consolidation, plots by anti-India forces, and negative propaganda. It witnessed a drop in its seats (240) and vote share (36.5 per cent), but managed to form the government.

It is also worth noting that during the last 11 years of the Modi government at the Centre, opposition parties also won elections in many states. These mainly include Trinamool in West Bengal, Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK) in Tamil Nadu, Jharkhand Mukti Morcha (JMM) in Jharkhand, Congress in Karnataka and Himachal, National Conference in Jammu & Kashmir and the Left in Kerala, etc. Even in the 70-member Delhi assembly elections, AAP won 67 seats in 2015 and 62 in 2020 and it also won 80 per cent of the seats in Punjab in 2022. Would these results have been possible if the Election Commission had been "biased" toward one party? In fact, most of the opposition, including the Congress leadership, have

lost the ability to see and understand their core problem.

Arrogance and a sense of dynastic entitlement have deprived them of introspection. They are living in a fantasy, completely disconnected from reality, and are unnecessarily blaming Prime Minister Modi and the Commission for 'vote chor' for every electoral debacle. Another bitter truth is that if for some reason voters get disillusioned with the BJP, they look for other alternatives instead of the main opposition, the Congress. In fact, most of the opposition parties – SP, RJD, Trinamool, DMK, NCP, AAP – have strengthened their roots by making inroads into the political base of the Congress. The truth is that when the 'people', i.e. the voters, repeatedly reject the Congress, then as part of an organised political strategy, institutions like the Election Commission – institutions like the Election Commission – are put in the dock. The only objective is to somehow maintain its declining political relevance amidst the alienation from the public, even if it means damaging the credibility of the country's constitutional institutions.

But Seher's father, Parvez, is firmly against it and is determined to marry her off to Mahid, who belongs to the powerful Mufti family. As Seher slowly begins to understand what it means to stand up for her own dreams, Mahid enters her life, a boy who looks privileged from the outside but carries wounds no one sees, knowing he's far from perfect. And while destiny nudges them toward each other, the mother and daughter quietly start a rebellion of their own, leaving viewers wondering if they can finally break free

2. What drew you to your role in particular?

A. Playing Kausar felt like a tribute to mothers, to their strength and the battles they fight so their chil-

ries inside her. What I focused on instead was understanding the quieter, internal parts of Kausar, the exhaustion of fighting the same battles again, the guilt of not being able to give her daughter more, and the tiny

Muslim-backdrop shows on TV?

A. What makes Seher Hone Ko Hai different is that it's not built on surface-level drama. This story is about a mother who wants her daughter to



have the education and opportunities she never got. Her past hasn't made her bitter, it has made her determined. Wanting a better

life for her daughter is a universal instinct, and the show captures that with honesty. It focuses on a mother's quiet courage as she fights for her daughter's future. That honesty, that truthfulness and courage, is what makes Seher Hone Ko Hai very different from other shows.

6. If you had to sum up Kausar's life in one line, what would it be?

A. If I had to sum up Kausar's life, I think it would be, 'Kausar isn't trying to change the world, she's just trying to change her daughter's world.'

7. What is your message to the viewers?

A. Now that Seher Hone Ko Hai has entered your homes, all I want to say is thank you. Every person on this team, from the writers to the crew, has put so much heart and honesty into bringing this world alive, and seeing viewers connect with it means everything to us. As actors, we've tried to keep the emotions real and grounded, and we hope you continue to stay with Seher and her journey. Let the characters grow on you, let their flaws and fights feel familiar. Your support truly keeps us going, and we're grateful for every bit of love you've shown the show so far. We hope Seher Hone Ko Hai becomes a small part of your everyday life, and we can't wait for you to experience what's coming next.

## Man impersonating Home Department Secretary defrauds brothers of ₹40 lakh in Lucknow

(Gns).

A man posing as a senior Home Department official at the Uttar Pradesh Secretariat has allegedly defrauded two brothers of ₹40 lakh by promising government tenders and jobs.

The fraud came to light after the victims filed a formal complaint, prompting police to launch an investigation.

According to the police complaint, Itesh Kumar, a resident of Dehradun, met the accused—identified as Sarvesh—in July 2024 at a rented house in Vinit Khand, Gomtinagar. Sarvesh allegedly claimed to be a Home Department Secretary and moved around in a Swift Dzire, Aura and Scorpio—each displaying the Uttar

Pradesh government emblem. He lived on the upper floor of the same building with his wife and children, frequently changed drivers, and claimed to be from Gorakhpur.

Sarvesh reportedly lured the victims by promising contracts for government tenders, parking tenders, and even government jobs. Trusting his claims, the brothers transferred ₹40 lakh to various accounts provided by him. To build confidence, Sarvesh initially issued a cheque for ₹1 lakh, which was later found to be invalid. Police said the accused had the money

deposited into accounts belonging to his acquaintances.

The victims also stated

When no work materialised, Sarvesh began avoiding their calls. By April 2025, he had vacated the rented house and stopped responding altogether. After the victims pressured him, he issued two more cheques, which bounced when deposited on June 21, 2025. Bank officials confirmed that Sarvesh's HDFC account had been closed for a year and had no balance.

Inspector Brijesh Chand Tiwari of Gomtinagar Police Station said an FIR has been registered and a detailed investigation is underway.

He urged the JKPSC to take note of the unprecedented stress on aspirants and consider postponing the exam in the interest of fairness and equal opportunity for all."


