(Gns). The political clash over illegal immigrants intensified as Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge traded direct accusations. Modi alleged that Congress encouraged illegal Bangladeshi immigration in Assam, while Kharge countered that the BJP used the issue to hide governance failures at the Centre and in the state.

Kharge argued that the ruling party should accept responsibility instead of blaming rivals over illegal immigrants and border control. "How can he blame the Opposition parties?" Kharge asked, stressing that law and order remains

a government duty, not an Opposition task, in both Delhi and Dispur.

Bangladeshi immigration in Assam and Kharge countering that the BJP uses the issue to hide governance failures.

Questioning the BJP's



exchanged accusations regarding illegal immigration, with Modi accusing Congress of encouraging

stance on illegal immigrants, Kharge highlighted that the same party runs governments at both levels.

"This government is there in the Centre, and in Assam also, his own government, that is called double-engine government. If they fail to protect, how can he blame the Opposition parties? Are we ruling there?" Kharge said, calling the charge politically driven.

Kharge further sharpened the attack on the BJP over illegal immigrants and security lapses. "When he fails, everything he puts on opposition, and I condemn such a statement. They are destroyers, we are not destroyers, and we are not defending anybody. In the interest of the country, whatever good we will do, but not supporting terrorists or infiltrators or others.

No Mining Allowed In Delhi-NCR: Environment Minister Bhupender Yadav Over Aravalli Protest

The article reports that the Environment Ministry maintains a ban on mining in the Aravalli core zone and NCR, with a Supreme Court approved framework preserving roughly 90 percent of the landscape. It covers protests in Rajasthan, government clarifications on mining eligibility, and the official definitions shaping future regulation.

(Gns). Protests over mining in the Aravallis spread across Rajasthan as Environment Minister Bhupender Yadav insisted that extraction remains banned in the sensitive core zone and in the National Capital Region. Yadav stressed that a Supreme Court freeze on fresh mining leases still applies and said the judgement does not open the

door for new mining in the Aravalli range.

The Centre also stated that over 90 per cent of the Aravalli landscape will stay notified as a protected area

range is prepared and cleared.

Environment Minister Bhupender Yadav clarified that mining remains banned in the Aravalli's core zone



under a Supreme Court-approved framework. Officials said this framework keeps all new mining leases on hold until a full management plan for the Aravalli

and NCR, with over 90% of the landscape protected under a Supreme Court-approved framework, amid protests in Rajasthan against mining operations.

The government stated that only 0.19% of the Aravalli's total area of 1.44 lakh square kilometers is eligible for mining.

Congress workers and activists from several organisations gathered in multiple locations in Rajasthan, shouting slogans for strict conservation of the Aravallis. Demonstrators demanded clear assurances against mining and other projects. Tension rose at some protest spots as participants clashed with the police while trying to push through barricades during marches focused on Aravalli range mining concerns.

Addressing accusations from the Congress and other critics that policy changes would damage the hills, Yadav rejected these charges.

'Do Namoon' Remark Sparks Yogi-Akhilesh Clash in UP Assembly

(Gns). Uttar Pradesh politics witnessed a sharp flashpoint on December 22, 2025, after Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath used the phrase "do namoon" during an Assembly debate, prompting an immediate and pointed response from Samajwadi Party chief Akhilesh Yadav. The exchange quickly escalated into a wider political row, with the opposition claiming the remark exposed internal tensions within the BJP and hinted at a power tussle between Delhi and Lucknow.

The confrontation unfolded during a heated discussion in the Assembly on allegations of smuggling of Codeine-based cough syrup. Opposition members accused the state government of failing to act in time and linked the alleged lapses to the deaths of children. Rejecting the charge outright, Yogi Adityanath asserted that no child had died in Uttar Pradesh due to the cough syrup, dismissing the allegations as baseless.

On December 22, 2025, Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath's use of "do namoon" during an Assembly debate sparked a row with Samajwadi Party leader Akhilesh Yadav, interpreted

as a comment on Rahul Gandhi and reflecting alleged tensions between BJP leaders in Delhi and Lucknow, amid accusations over the smuggling of

widely interpreted by legislators and political observers as a swipe at Rahul Gandhi, the Leader of the Opposition in the Lok Sabha, and Akhilesh Yadav,



cough syrup and related child deaths.

While rebutting the opposition, the Chief Minister then turned his fire towards rival leaders, without naming anyone directly. Addressing Samajwadi Party members, he said there were "two namoon" - one sitting in Delhi and another in Lucknow-who, according to him, leave the country whenever serious national debates take place. He added that a similar pattern could soon be seen with the opposition's "babua", suggesting frequent foreign trips while party workers continue protests at home.

Though no names were mentioned, the remark was

former Uttar Pradesh chief minister and now an MP. Yogi Adityanath later shared a clip of his speech on X from his official handle, linking his denial of cough syrup-related deaths with the broader political attack.

Akhilesh Yadav responded within minutes on social media, arguing that the Chief Minister's comment amounted to an admission of friction within the BJP. He claimed the reference to "two namoon" reflected an ongoing struggle between the party's central leadership and its state leadership in Uttar Pradesh.

The episode followed sustained opposition pressure in the Assembly,

where parties alleged that stricter action against illegal cough syrup smuggling could have prevented hundreds of child deaths and demanded accountability from the government. Yogi Adityanath, however, remained firm in his assertion that such deaths had not occurred in the state.

The latest clash adds to a series of sharp political exchanges between the two leaders. Earlier, during a campaign speech ahead of the Bihar elections, Yogi Adityanath had targeted Rahul Gandhi, Akhilesh Yadav and RJD leader Tejashwi Prasad Yadav with a controversial comparison, accusing them of lacking the ability to speak, see or hear the truth.

The Samajwadi Party has long maintained that the BJP's state government and its central leadership are engaged in a quiet contest for influence in Uttar Pradesh. Citing decisions such as the choice of deputy chief ministers and key bureaucratic appointments, the party argues that efforts have been made to curb Yogi Adityanath's authority. The "do namoon" remark, the opposition now claims, is another sign of those underlying tensions spilling into the open.

Aviation Turmoil Unleashed

Every few years, India gets a reminder of just how fragile its aviation ecosystem really is. This time, it took a week-long meltdown at IndiGo a prominent airline service, hundreds of cancellations, airports reduced to holding zones for luggage, and passengers stranded across the country, to expose a truth policymakers prefer to ignore: when a major chunk of the market is controlled by just two airlines, one company's internal crisis becomes a national emergency. IndiGo's shortage of pilots, triggered by the rollout of long-delayed fatigue-management rules, should have disrupted one airline. Instead, it paralysed India's entire aviation network .

Fares shot up to Rs40,000-80,000, refunds lagged for days, and alternative carriers simply didn't have the capacity to absorb the shock. In a competitive market, passengers would have options. In India's duopolistic one, they had none. The fatigue rules themselves were not the villain. Pilot exhaustion is a well-documented safety threat globally, and aligning India's Flight Duty Time Limitations (FDTL) with international norms is long overdue. But the transition was mishandled on every side. Regulators announced the rules almost two years ago, then delayed and re-delayed their enforcement, only to push through implementation abruptly, leaving airlines scrambling. IndiGo, famous for tight turnarounds and a "lean-staffing" model, underestimated how many additional pilots it needed. The regulator underestimated how quickly a brittle system can collapse.

This combination, poor planning meets a market with almost no buffers, is why passengers ended up paying the price. What's missing from the conversation is the structural cause: India's aviation sector lacks depth. When just two airlines, IndiGo and Air India, hold over 90 per cent of market share, the entire system depends on their ability to function flawlessly. No modern industry should operate on this kind of razor's edge. The German aviation sector didn't collapse when Lufthansa suffered an IT system outage. The US doesn't grind to a halt when Delta faces a staffing shortfall. In those markets, multiple players create resilience. In India, passengers face a system where when "one airline falters, everyone suffers." And consumers suffered immensely.

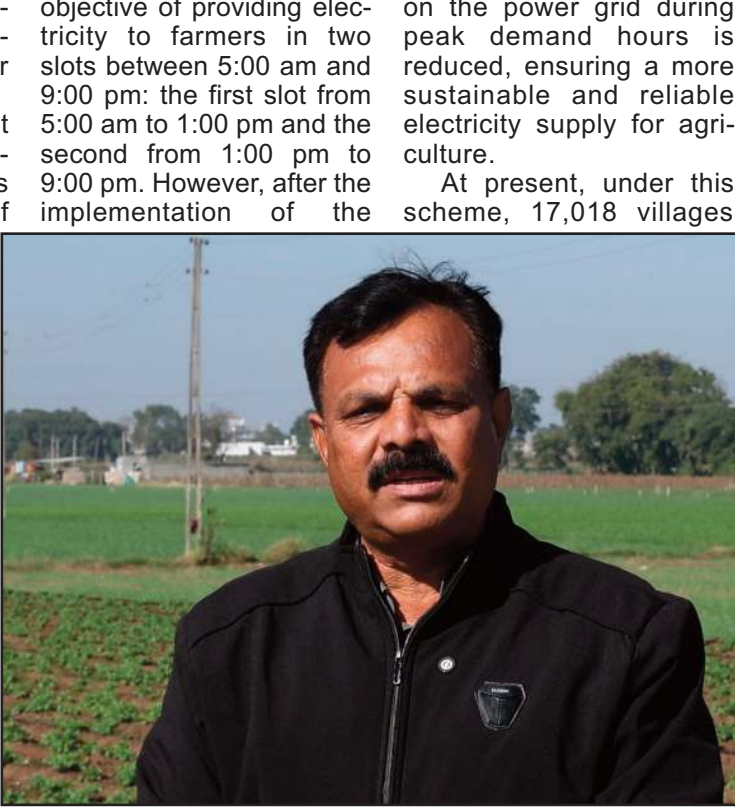
People missed job interviews, medical appointments and weddings. Some reached airports at dawn only to discover their flights cancelled with no SMS alert. Refunds trickled in only after government orders. A country aiming to become the world's third largest aviation market cannot operate with outdated passenger protection norms. India needs a clear and enforceable Air Passenger Bill of Rights, one that guarantees automatic funds, timely alerts and fair compensation for last minute cancellations, without burdening airlines under knee-jerk regulations. But consumer rights alone won't fix a market with too little competition. For genuine resilience, India must remove barriers that make it hard for new airlines to scale: high ATF taxes that erode margins, slot allocation policies that reward in cumb ents, and regulatory unpredictability that discourages investment. The government says India has room for five major airlines.

That won't happen without policy reforms that make market entry easier and ensure a level playing field. IndiGo's crisis wasn't just about fatigue rules or rostering miscalculations. It was a stress test for the entire sector, and the system failed. India's aviation future depends on embracing what every competitive, consumer-friendly market eventually learns: choice is stability. The more players in the sky, the fewer passengers will ever be stranded because one airline miscalculated. If India wants a resilient aviation ecosystem, it must stop fire-fighting and start enabling competition. The skies need more carriers, more capacity, and more consumer choice. Otherwise, this won't be the last time passengers pay for a crisis they didn't create. (The writer is Indian Policy Associate, Consumer Choice Center.)

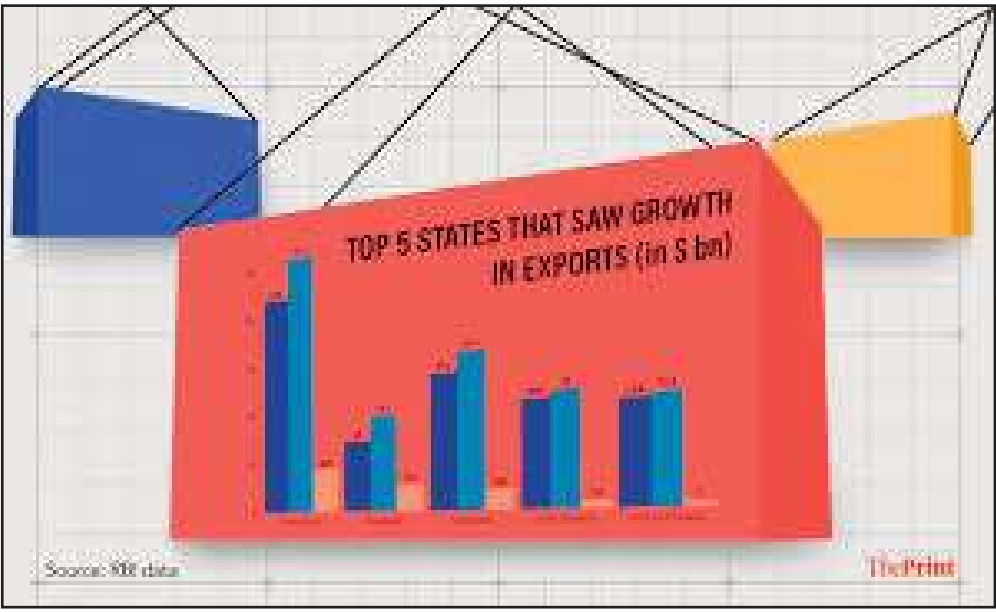

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Empowered but powerless

(Gns). In 1993, the 73rd Constitutional Amendment was hailed as the dawn of Gram Swaraj – village self-rule rooted in democratic decentralisation. The promise was clear: Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) would no longer be mere implementing arms of Delhi or state capitals, but genuine institutions of self-government. Three decades later, that promise is gasping for fiscal breath. India

has successfully elected millions of village representatives. What it has failed to do is give them the one thing that guarantees autonomy: control over money. A recent RBI report on the Finances of Panchayati Raj Institutions presents a stark picture. Own Source Revenue (OSR) remains negligible, with Panchayats depending on state and central transfers for nearly 95 percent of their funds.

Decentralisation, in practice, has remained administrative – not fiscal. Yet this failure is not uniform. The Panchayats Devolution Index 2024 reveals that India's problem is not design, but political will. The contrast across regions is striking. The Devolution Index – which measures the transfer of funds, functions, and functionalities – shows southern states decisively ahead. Karnataka tops the list with

a score of 72.23, followed by Kerala (70.59) and Tamil Nadu (68.38). The national average languishes at 43.69, while areas such as Jammu & Kashmir (27.85) and Jharkhand (27.73) remain near the bottom.

Why does the South lead? The answer lies in clarity and commitment. States like Karnataka and Andhra Pradesh have issued unambiguous orders empowering Panchayats to levy and col-

lect taxes. In Kerala, Panchayats are not merely civic bodies; they function as planning units with independent budgets, authority



over property taxes, and freedom to levy user charges without constant state approval. Decentralisation here is institutionalised, not rhetorical. Elsewhere, Panchayats remain trapped in a structural bind. Property tax – the most reliable source of local revenue – accounts for nearly 40 per cent of OSR nationwide. Yet India's property tax-to-GDP ratio is just 0.2 per cent, among the lowest globally. This is not because rural citizens refuse to pay.

It is because, in many states, they are never properly asked. In Uttar Pradesh and Odisha, Gram Panchayats have either not been fully authorised to levy property tax or lack the operational ability to do so. Even where powers exist

a useful model, where statutory minimum floor rates for local taxes are fixed by the state. This allows local leaders to tell residents, "The law requires this," shielding them from direct blame while ensuring revenue flows. Another vast but neglected opportunity lies in common property resources – ponds, grazing lands, weekly markets, and minor forests.

Though legally meant for community benefit, control often lies with Forest or Revenue departments. A Panchayat attempting to lease a pond for fisheries or a market shed for weekly haats frequently runs into inter-departmental red tape. Transferring Operations and Maintenance rights to PRIs would not only generate revenue but also improve local stewardship and conservation. The solution is neither complex nor unknown. The Ministry of Panchayati Raj's digital platform Samartha, aimed at end-to-end digitisation of OSR management, is a step forward. Digitisation reduces leakage, improves transparency, and creates reliable tax databases.

But technology cannot substitute political intent. State governments must recognise that hoarding fiscal power at the capital is inefficient. Home Minister

Amit Shah has rightly noted that Panchayati Raj cannot succeed without revenue autonomy. Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath has similarly called for "innovative practices" to boost Panchayat income. These statements must now translate into policy. A three-pronged approach is essential: Mandatory devolution: States must be legally bound to devolve taxation powers – especially property tax – to Gram Panchayats. Capacity building: Scalable training programmes, such as those developed with IIM-Ahmedabad, must equip Panchayat officials with skills in valuation, accounting, and revenue management. Incentivisation : Finance Commission grants should be tightly linked to OSR performance. Panchayats that collect more should receive matching grants, creating a virtuous cycle. The 73rd Amendment delivered democratic decentralisation. But democracy without financial autonomy is hollow. Until Panchayats can pay their electricity bills without waiting for a state grant, Gram Swaraj will remain unfinished business. The southern states have shown what is possible. The rest of India must now follow.

Technical Snag Forces Air India Flight to Abort Mumbai Journey, Lands Safely in Delhi

(Gns). An Air India Delhi-Mumbai flight returned to Indira Gandhi International Airport shortly after takeoff on 22 December after the crew noticed low engine oil pressure in the right engine, according to officials. The aircraft, operating as AI887, landed safely back in Delhi, where all passengers and crew were taken off the plane without any reported injuries.

Air India said the affected aircraft is undergoing technical checks after the diversion. The airline apologised to passengers for the disruption and said

alternative travel options were being arranged so that everyone reached Mumbai. The Tata-owned carrier also stressed that the "safety and wellbeing" of the passengers and the crew remains Air India's top priority.

On December 22, an Air India Delhi-Mumbai flight, AI887, returned to Delhi shortly after takeoff due to low engine oil pressure, leading to a safe landing and passenger disembarkation, and the Directorate General of Civil Aviation is now examining the incident. Additionally, an Air India Express flight

from Vijayawada to Visakhapatnam was canceled last week due to a technical snag, with passengers including notable figures receiving alternative travel arrangements.

Explaining the sequence of events, Air India said: "The crew operating flight AI887 from Delhi to Mumbai on 22 December decided to return to Delhi shortly after take-off due to a technical issue as per standard operating procedure. The aircraft landed safely at Delhi and the passengers and crew have disembarked," the statement read. "The aircraft is under-

going the necessary checks. Our ground team at Delhi is providing immediate assistance to the passengers and alternative arrangements have been made to fly them to their destination shortly."

The Directorate General of Civil Aviation is also examining the Delhi-Mumbai flight case. The DGCA said the matter will be probed by the airline's permanent investigation board. Findings from this internal board are expected to support the broader regulatory assessment of the technical problem reported on the Boeing B777-300ER.

US Pursuing Third Oil Tanker Near Venezuela

(Gns). The United States has deployed considerable naval resources to the Caribbean in order to exert pressure on Caracas. The United States is pursuing an oil tanker in waters near Venezuela, according to multiple news agency reports.

Multiple news reports indicate the United States is pursuing an oil tanker near Venezuela, alleging it's part of Venezuela's sanctioned 'dark fleet' and flying a false flag; the U.S. has seized multiple vessels and President Trump has announced a blockade, while Venezuela denounces these actions as theft and piracy.

Washington considered the vessel to be part of Venezuela's "sanctioned dark fleet" under "Venezuela's illegal sanctions evasion," according to the Reuters and Associated Press reports each citing an unnamed US official. Both reports cited a US official as saying the vessel was flying a false flag and had been placed under a judicial seizure order by the US.

Reuters cited a different official as saying that the tanker had not been boarded and that interceptions can also take the form of

sailing close to the vessel being pursued.

On Wednesday, US President Donald Trump



announced a blockade of sanctioned oil tankers entering and leaving Venezuela.

On Truth Social, Trump also announced that he was designating the Venezuelan regime as "a foreign terrorist organisation." He cited reasons

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'Divine Intervention' Saved Pakistan After India Launched Op Sindoor: Asim Munir

(Gns). Pakistan's Army Chief Field Marshal Asim Munir has claimed that "divine intervention" played a role in Pakistan's confrontation with India earlier this year, a viral video shows.

The clip, widely shared on social media platforms, shows Munir invoking religious imagery while reflecting on the military standoff that followed India's Operation Sindoor in May.

In a viral video from the National Ulema Conference in Islamabad, Pakistan's Army Chief Field Marshal Asim Munir claimed divine intervention aided Pakistan during its confrontation with India following Operation Sindoor in May; he also urged the Taliban government in Afghanistan to choose between supporting



the TTP and maintaining ties with Pakistan.

The video, reportedly recorded on December 10 during the National Ulema Conference in Islamabad, captures Munir quoting a verse from the Quran: "If Allah helps you, none can overcome you."

He suggested that Pakistan had experienced divine support during the

conflict, describing the intervention as something that was "felt." His remarks, couched in faith-based language, implied that unseen forces aided Pakistan at a critical juncture.

However, Oneindia could not verify the authenticity of the video.

Operation Sindoor Munir's comments refer to the events of May, when

India launched Operation Sindoor in response to the Pahalgam terror attack that claimed 26 lives. The Indian Air Force carried out precision strikes on multiple terror camps located deep inside Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK).

According to officials, the targets included camps in Bahawalpur and Muridke in Punjab province-areas long associated with Pakistan-based terror outfits-as well as facilities in Muzaffarabad and Kotli in PoK. These camps were reportedly used for recruitment, weapons training, and infiltration planning.

Indian authorities described the operation as a calibrated effort to degrade terror networks without escalating into a broader conflict.

The big Aravalli storm: Decoding fault lines, mistrust and Centre's reply

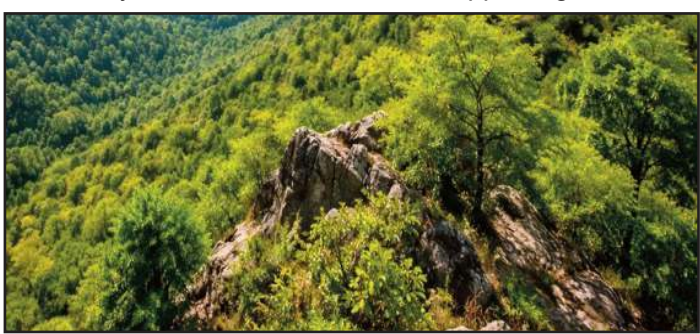
(Gns). It is easy to thrash criticism from rival parties as "politically motivated", but not public anger or movements that sharpen perceptions, as seen in several past controversies.

Facing mounting political attacks, activist protests and environmental outrage, the Centre on Sunday issued a detailed clarification on the Aravalli hills, dismissing allegations that it had diluted mining protections following the Supreme Court's November 20 acceptance of a new definition of the ecologically-sensitive range proposed by the Environment Ministry.

Whether the Centre's response will put to rest decades-long debate and

environmental concerns on already-scarred Aravallis remains to be seen.

The latest row intensified after years of inconsis-



tent state-level definitions prompted the apex court to seek a uniform standard.

Under the new definition, an "Aravalli Hill" is any landform in designated Aravalli districts with an elevation of 100 metres or more above its local elevation. This raised concerns

about exploitation of hills less than that.

Along with the ministry issuing background notes and supporting material, bar on mining on the hills, their supporting slopes and within a 500-metre buffer zone, he said, stressing that "there is no relaxation".

In any case, according to the minister, only about 0.19 to 2% of the total 1.47 lakh sq km Aravalli region could even theoretically qualify for mining, and any such activity would still require Supreme Court-approved sustainable mining plans and multiple statutory clearances.

Rejecting claims of policy dilution, Yadav said no new mining leases would be issued in mapped hill areas and that Green Aravalli initiatives remain in force, describing the allegations as "lies" and blaming misinformation for unnecessary panic.

Union Environment Minister Bhopendra Yadav asserted that more than 90% of the Aravalli landscape remains under strict protection and that it was "completely wrong" to claim that mining had been opened up across the region. There is an explicit

The report exposes a vast network involving drug trafficking, hawala transactions, and alleged political links.

The report further states that the smuggled consignments were distributed through warehouses in

According to the SIT, the kingpin of the racket is Vibhor Rana, who was granted a licence in 2016 during the tenure of the then Samajwadi Party government led by Akhilesh Yadav.

The investigation reveals that after strict action against madrasas near the Nepal border, traffickers panicked. Fearing arrest, Vibhor allegedly requested pharmaceutical company Abbott to take back nearly one crore bottles of cough syrup.

Meanwhile, in a major crackdown, police seized cough syrup worth approximately ₹50 lakh in Etah district. Acting on a tip-off around midnight on Sunday, the Agra Narcotics Team, led by Inspector Harvendra

Mishra, along with local police under the supervision of CO Aliganj Nitish Garg, cordoned off a village and raided a tobacco warehouse.

During the raid, 47 cartons of cough syrup were recovered from the warehouse. Four people — Pramod Shakya, Jitendra Yadav, Jitendra Shakya, and Punjab Singh including a retired Army personnel, were arrested, while several others managed to flee.

Preliminary questioning revealed that the accused had been involved in cough syrup smuggling for a long time and supplied the contraband to drug dealers across nearby districts. The recovered bottles carried the name of the "Wing" company, but their batch numbers had been scratched off, raising suspicion that the syrup was meant for illegal narcotics use.
