

## Amit Shah Reveals Massive 40 Kg IED Triggered Red Fort Area Explosion

(Gns). Union Home Minister Amit Shah used the Anti-Terrorism Conference-2025 to disclose that 40 kg of explosive caused the Red Fort area blast in Delhi on November 10, and said investigators recovered three tonnes of additional explosives before detonation, while calling for stronger national databases to tackle organised crime and terrorism.

Shah was speaking at the inauguration of the two-day Anti-Terrorism Conference-2025, organised by the NIA, where top officers from central agencies and state police forces attended as the minister also released the NIA's updated crime manual and unveiled two new national-level databases on terror-

ists and organised criminal networks.

At the Anti-Terrorism Conference-2025 organized by the NIA, Home Minister Amit Shah revealed that 40 kg of explosives caused the Red Fort blast on November 10, while three tonnes were recovered. He emphasized stronger national databases to counter organized crime and terrorism, highlighting the need for cooperation between central agencies and state police, and also mentioned Pahalgam incident related to damaging communal harmony.

Detailing recent terror cases, Shah said the Pahalgam and Delhi investigations showed how coordinated work could deliver strong results, and praised

Jammu and Kashmir Police, stating, "Pahalgam and Delhi blast cases are not examples of routine policing, but outstanding instances of watertight investigation," while stressing that such probes strengthen confidence in national security systems.


Shah linked the Pahalgam incident to attempts to disturb social order, stating that the attackers behind the Baisaran valley strike wanted to damage communal harmony across the country, and said these motives reinforced the need for better information sharing, stronger databases, and close cooperation between states and central agencies on organised crime and terror funding.

crime networks initially operate for the purpose of ransom and extortion, but when their leaders flee abroad and settle there, they automatically come into contact with terrorist organisations and then use the proceeds from ransom and extortion to spread terrorism within the country," according to the official statement.

Shah urged every state to act against such networks using the new databases, saying state police must, under guidance from the NIA and CBI, and with IB support, work to eliminate organised crime in their respective areas, and stressed that the database on terrorists and criminals should become a core element of the government's zero-terror policy.

## Are Pawars Joining Hands For Pune Civic Polls? Talks Collapse After Ajit Offers Only 35 Seats

(Gns). A high-stakes meeting between Ajit Pawar's NCP and his uncle Sharad Pawar's faction of NCP ended in a stalemate, NDTV reported citing sources.

The discussion, centered on the upcoming January 15 civic polls, collapsed over the specifics of seat-sharing. Sources indicate that the younger Pawar offered a deal that was essentially a non-starter for the veteran leader: the Sharad Pawar faction was allocated 35 seats, with the added stipulation that they must campaign under the Ajit-led faction's "clock" symbol.

Ajit Pawar's faction and Sharad Pawar's NCP failed to reach an agreement, leading Sharad Pawar to rejoin the Maha Vikas Aghadi with Congress and Uddhav Thackeray's Shiv Sena; the factions may merge, with Ajit Pawar

leading in Maharashtra and Supriya Sule nationally after Sharad Pawar's retirement in 2026.

Aghadi (MVA) fold, initiating discussions with the Congress and Uddhav Thackeray's Shiv Sena to finalize a unified front.

Pawar retire from active politics following the conclusion of his Rajya Sabha term in April 2026.

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## 28.9 million voter names missing in UP SIR; SP claims BJP to suffer major electoral setback

The Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of the electoral rolls in Uttar Pradesh has been completed, revealing that the names of nearly 28.9 million voters were either unresponsive or failed to submit their enumeration forms.

The exercise has triggered strong political reactions, with the opposition Samajwadi Party (SP) claiming that the large-scale deletion of voter names would severely impact the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) in the 2027 Assembly elections.

SP president Akhilesh Yadav, while targeting the ruling party, said, "The Chief Minister himself claims that 85-90 per cent

of his own voters have been cut. If 85 per cent are removed, it means a loss of around 61,000 votes in each assembly constituency. In such a situation, how can the BJP form a government? It will not even be able to reach double digits.

The BJP leadership has dug a pit for itself and fallen into it."

Although there were rumours that the deadline for submitting enumeration forms would be extended for a third time, the Election Commission of India (ECI) did not grant any further

extension.

According to the official schedule, the draft electoral roll will be published on December 31. The period for filing claims and objections will run from December 31, 2025, to January 30, 2026. The disposal of claims and

objections will take place between December 31, 2025, and February 21, 2026. The final electoral roll for Uttar Pradesh will be published on February 28, 2026.

Uttar Pradesh Chief Electoral Officer Navdeep

Rinwa stated on Saturday, "Before the implementation of the SIR, there were a total of 154.4 million registered voters in the state. The first phase of enumeration and digitization was completed on December 26, and so far, 28.9 million voters have been found unresponsive. The final figures and draft list will be released on December 31."

According to official sources, out of the total unresponsive voters, 12.6 million have permanently migrated outside Uttar Pradesh, 4.595 million have passed away, 2.332 million are duplicate entries, 8.42 million are untraceable, and 9.37 million voters did not submit their forms.

### Trial of Will

Ukraine's latest peace proposal marks a subtle but significant shift in how Kyiv is trying to end a war that has long defied clean diplomatic solutions. Rather than framing peace as a binary choice between territorial integrity and continued fighting, the plan advances a more ambiguous idea: de-escalation without surrender. In doing so, it exposes both the limits of compromise and the deeper strategic contest that still defines the conflict.

At the centre of the proposal is the concept of demilitarised or economically neutral zones in eastern Ukraine, particularly in parts of Donbas still under Ukrainian control. This is not an offer to redraw borders or legitimise occupation. Instead, it suggests a managed reduction of military presence, matched on both sides, while retaining Ukrainian administration and policing. The logic is clear. Kyiv is signalling flexibility on how territory is defended, but not on who owns or governs it. Any pullback of forces carries obvious dangers after years of brutal fighting. Yet the alternative ~ an endless war of attrition ~ also carries mounting costs, both human and economic. The proposed zones are less about trust in Moscow and more about creating enforceable mechanisms that make renewed large-scale offensives harder to launch unnoticed.


What gives the plan its sharper edge is the emphasis on security guarantees. Ukraine is no longer seeking vague assurances or symbolic partnerships. It is demanding a framework that mirrors the collective defence logic associated with the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation, even if formal membership remains unresolved. Combined with a sizable standing military, this reflects Kyiv's core lesson from recent history: peace without deterrence is merely an interlude. The implicit message is that rejection would trigger deeper Western involvement, from heavier arms supplies to harsher sanctions. In this sense, the plan is as much about shaping external incentives as it is about resolving disputes on the ground. From the Kremlin's perspective, the offer is unlikely to be attractive. President Vladimir Putin has consistently framed the war as a question of control, not coexistence. Demilitarised zones that remain under Ukrainian authority undermine the narrative of irreversible territorial gains.

Acceptance would imply limits to Russia's ambitions – something Moscow has so far resisted. Yet, the proposal's real audience may not be Russia alone. By insisting on a future referendum, Ukrainian leaders are anchoring any settlement in domestic consent. This reinforces democratic legitimacy at a moment when external actors, including US President Donald Trump, are pressing for rapid conclusions. It also signals to Europe that Ukraine's eventual integration into the European Union is tied to stability, not capitulation. Ultimately, the plan does not promise peace in the immediate sense. What it offers instead is a framework to test intentions. If Russia refuses, the diplomatic burden shifts decisively. If it engages, the war may enter a phase where guns fall silent even as fundamental disagreements persist. Either way, Ukraine is asserting that any end to the conflict must balance realism with resolve ~ and that survival, not exhaustion, now defines its negotiating position.

## The year 2025 reached a murderous milestone

On December 10, the year 2025 reached a murderous milestone. In 2024, the Committee to Protect Journalists (CPJ) had recorded 126 journalists and media workers killed, the highest number since the CPJ first began keeping records in 1992. In 2025, the figure was matched with three weeks of the year still to go. One nationality, Palestinian, has paid by far the highest price.

Israel-Gaza war began in 2023," the CPJ reported. What does this mean for audiences' understanding of a world where international affairs are dominated by war, the climate crisis and unpredictable politics? As far back as the early years of the US, and through the European revolutions of the 19th centuries, information and freedom have been

linked. In 1787, Thomas Jefferson wrote: "Were it left to me to decide whether we should have a government without newspapers, or newspapers without a government, I should not hesitate a moment to prefer the latter." Today, we have access to more media than at any other time in human history.

But this vast amount of information has not necessarily meant more reliable information. Governments and tech companies striving to control the message often succeed. Bottom of Form Israel has banned international journalists entering Gaza. Palestinian journalists continue, at great risk, to report from the territory. Russia, meanwhile, has placed restrictions on reporting its "special military operation" – in a word, war – on Ukraine. A

generation ago, when the CPJ first began keeping data on journalists' deaths, it was different.

The fall of the Berlin Wall and the end of the cold war allowed international

business interests – the news media often are. But there was plurality where previously there had only been the party line. The 1990s, imperfect though they were as a time of



media organisations freedom to work as never before in the former Soviet bloc. As those countries embraced political change, they encouraged freer media to flourish within their new societies. True, these media were often influenced by political and

press freedom, were better than what has followed since. As the media academic and former foreign correspondent Peter Greste has persuasively argued, the aftermath of 9/11 involved state power extending, "into control over information and ideas.

They did that by loosening the definitions of what constituted 'terrorism' and 'national security'. Greste's words were informed by the price he had paid for his own journalism. In late 2013, along with two colleagues, Mohamed Fadel Fahmy and Baher Mohammad, he was detained in Egypt on terrorism charges. He spent 400 days in prison. The charges had resulted from the fact that he had spoken to the Muslim Brotherhood as part of his reporting. "How do you accurately and fairly report on Egypt's ongoing political struggle without talking to everyone involved?" he wrote at the time.

It is not new that governments seek to control media. What is new is that the US is so proudly among them. Jefferson would

probably not like what the current US government is doing, especially its recent policy of restricting access to the Pentagon for reporters who themselves refuse restrictions on their reporting. The words that follow Jefferson's discussion of the relative merits of governments and newspapers are less well remembered: "But I should mean that every man should receive those papers and be capable of reading them." Outdated gendered language aside, that, today, is the problem.

For while we have more and more media, we have far less media freedom. In the age of mass media, news organisations have largely controlled the means of distribution.

Today, the tech companies take the lead. Not everyone is receiving the "papers".

Beyond diplomacy, India's peace credentials are grounded in decades of service.

As one of the largest contributors to UN peace-keeping missions ~ over 25,000 troops across 50 missions ~ India has demonstrated that peace is a practice, not just a position. From Lebanon to Congo, Indian peacekeepers have protected civilians, rebuilt communities, and earned admiration for professionalism and compassion. If peace is India's message, prosperity is its method. The last decade has seen India rise from the world's tenth-largest economy to the fifth, and it is poised to enter the top three. Sectors from digital infrastructure to space, agriculture to aviation, defence manufacturing to renewable energy have undergone radical expansion. Railway has identified six major cities under its jurisdiction for capacity enhancement under this national plan. These are at Mumbai, Surat, Vadodara, Ahmedabad, Ujjain and Indore. Capacity augmentation in these cities will be undertaken in a phased

manner through terminal expansion, development of maintenance and stabilizing infrastructure, and improvement of sectional capacity, in line with future traffic requirements.

Enhancement of Long Distance Train Capacity in Mumbai region

Western Railway is undertaking significant measures to enhance passenger train handling capacity in the Mumbai region. These include new terminuses, additional lines, new maintenance facilities, platform extensions, and many more.

Western Railway currently handles 44 long distance trains from Mumbai area and with these infrastructure work, Western Railway plans to introduce approx. 65 more long distance trains.

## CAQM conducts extensive inspection of MCG-main-tained 125 road stretches in Gurugram on 26.12.2025

(Gns).

The Commission for Air Quality Management in NCR and Adjoining Areas (CAQM) conducted an extensive inspection drive on 26.12.2025 in Gurugram to review road-cleaning and sweeping operations and upkeep of road stretches maintained by the Municipal Corporation Gurugram (MCG).

The inspection was done as part of its continuous monitoring and enforcement efforts under the statutory framework of the extant Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP), with the objective of evaluating on-ground compliance with dust mitigation measures and identifying associated issues such as accumulation of road dust, Municipal Solid Waste (MSW),

Construction and Demolition (C&D) waste and instances of open burning.

A total of 17 inspection teams, comprising 15 teams of the Haryana State

Pollution Control Board (HSPCB) and 02 teams of the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB), were directed by the Commission for inspection of 125 road stretches under the jurisdiction of MCG in Gurugram.

Geo-tagged and timestamped photographic documentation was collected by the inspection teams and submitted to the Commission as part of the consolidated inspection report.

The findings of the inspection revealed that out of the 125 road stretches inspected, 34 stretches

exhibited High Visible Dust levels, 58 stretches showed Moderate Dust, 29 stretches recorded Low Dust intensity, while only 04 stretches were found to have No Visible Dust. A



large number of stretches observed with high visible dust were also found to have significant accumulation of MSW and C&D waste, along with multiple instances of open burning, indicating serious deficiencies in routine road maintenance, waste management and enforcement at the

field level.

Several road stretches across different wards and sectors of Gurugram, including residential colonies, internal roads and arterial stretches, were identified with persistent dust accumulation and waste dumping. The presence of open burning and unmanaged waste on multiple stretches further aggravated the dust conditions, highlighting the need for immediate corrective measures and strengthened supervision by the concerned agency.

The Commission observed that the overall inspection results point towards the need for significant strengthening of on-ground operations by MCG, particularly with respect to regular mechanical sweeping.

Officials say the overhaul comes with the state expected to vote for the Assembly within the next six months.

The removed entries include voters marked due to death, migration to other places, or duplication

figures reflect only confirmed electors, excluding those still under verification.

The Election Commission of India updated Assam's electoral rolls, listing

2,51,09,754 registered voters after deleting 10,56,291 entries and reconfirming 93,021 D-voters in preparation for the upcoming Assembly elections, with officials in Guwahati checking voter lists.

According to the integrated draft rolls released on Saturday, the cleaned-up database aims to reduce errors during the upcoming Assam Assembly

elections. Polling staff have been cross-checking documents and previous lists to ensure that only eligible voters stay on the rolls across the state.

## Govt Notifies Guidelines for Shipbuilding Assistance, Development Schemes; ₹44,700 Crs Outlay to Boost India's Shipbuilding Capacity

New Delhi, December 27, 2025: The Ministry of Ports, Shipping & Waterways (MoPSW) notified the operational guidelines for two major shipbuilding initiatives—the Shipbuilding Financial Assistance Scheme (SBFAS) and the Shipbuilding Development Scheme (SbDS)—aimed at strengthening India's domestic shipbuilding capacity and improving global competitiveness. The approved guidelines lay down a transparent and accountable framework for implementation.

Speaking on the occasion, the Union Minister of

Ports, Shipping & Waterways (MoPSW), Sarbananda Sonowal said, "Prime Minister Narendra Modi ji's leadership has given India's shipbuilding sector a decisive policy reset. These guidelines create a stable and transparent framework that will revive domestic shipbuilding, boosting forward

and backward linkage amping 'Make in India' initiative, enable large-scale investment and build world-class capacity, positioning India as a major maritime nation on the path to Viksit Bharat and Aatmanirbhar Bharat."

Under SBFAS, which has a total corpus of ₹24,736 crore, the government will provide financial assistance ranging from 15% to 25% per vessel,

depending on the vessel category. The scheme introduces graded support for small normal, large normal and specialised vessels,

under which ship owners

scrapping vessels at Indian yards will receive a credit equivalent to 40% of the scrap value, linking ship recycling with new ship construction and supporting a circular economy approach.

Independent valuation and

milestone-based assessments have been made mandatory to strengthen governance and ensure efficient use of public funds.

Over the next decade, SBFAS is expected to support shipbuilding projects worth about ₹96,000 crore, stimulate domestic manufacturing and generate employment across the maritime value chain.

The Shipbuilding Development Scheme (SbDS), with a budgetary outlay of ₹19,989 crore, focuses on long-term capacity and capability creation.

With stage-wise disbursement linked to defined milestones and backed by security instruments. Incentives for series orders are also included.

The scheme provides for the establishment of a National Shipbuilding Mission to ensure coordinated planning and execution of shipbuilding initiatives. It also introduces a Shipbreaking Credit Note,
