



# Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi addresses Parakram Diwas programme in Andaman & Nicobar Islands via Videoconferencing

(Gns). Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi addressed the Parakram Diwas programme in Andaman & Nicobar Islands via Videoconferencing today. Speaking on the occasion, Shri Modi stated that January 23 is the glorious date of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose's birth anniversary. He remarked that Netaji's valor and courage inspire us and fill us with reverence for him. He highlighted that in recent years, Parakram Diwas has become an integral festival of the nation's spirit. Shri Modi said it is a happy coincidence that January 23 is Parakram

Diwas, January 25 is National Voters' Day, January 26 is Republic Day, January 29 is Beating Retreat, and January 30 is the death anniversary of revered Babu, creating a new tradition of celebrating the grand festival of the Republic. He extended greetings to all citizens on Parakram Diwas. Noting that in 2026, the main celebration of Parakram Diwas is being held in Andaman and Nicobar, Shri Modi highlighted that the history of Andaman and Nicobar, filled with valor, sacrifice, and courage, the stories of patriots like Veer Savarkar in the Cellular Jail, and its

connection with Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose make this celebration even more special. The Prime Minister remarked that the land of Andaman symbolizes the belief that the idea of freedom never ends. He said that many revolutionaries were tortured here and many fighters sacrificed their lives, but instead of extinguishing, the spark of the freedom struggle grew stronger. Shri Modi stated that as a result, the land of Andaman and Nicobar became witness to the first sunrise of free India. He recalled that even before 1947, on December 30, 1943, the tricolor was hoisted here with



the waves of the ocean as witness. The Prime Minister recalled that in 2018, when the 75th anniversary of this great event was marked, he had the privilege of hoisting the tricolor at the same place

on December 30. Shri Modi remarked that as the national anthem played by the ocean shore, the tricolor fluttering in strong winds seemed to call out that countless dreams of freedom fighters had come true. Shri Modi stated that after independence, the glorious history of the Andaman and Nicobar Islands should have been preserved, but at that time those who came to power carried a sense of insecurity. He remarked that they wanted to limit the credit for freedom to only one family, and in this political self-interest, the nation's history

was neglected. Shri Modi highlighted that Andaman and Nicobar too were left tied to the identity of colonial rule, with its islands still known by the names of British officers even seventy years after independence. The Prime Minister said that his government ended this injustice of history, and therefore Port Blair has now become 'Shri Vijaypuram', a name that reminds us of Netaji's victory. He added that similarly, other islands were renamed as Swaraj Dweep, Shaheed Dweep, and Subhash Dweep. Shri Modi recalled that in 2023, 21 islands of Andaman were named after 21 Param Vir Chakra awardees. He emphasized that today, names linked to slavery are being erased in Andaman and Nicobar, and the new names of free India are establishing their identity. The Prime Minister further remarked that Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose was not only a great hero of the freedom struggle but also a visionary of independent

India. He envisioned a nation modern in form yet rooted in India's ancient consciousness. Shri Modi said that it is our responsibility to acquaint today's generation with Netaji's vision, and expressed happiness that his government is fulfilling this responsibility. He highlighted that a museum dedicated to Netaji has been built at the Red Fort in Delhi, a grand statue of Netaji has been installed near India Gate, and the contribution of the INA has been remembered in the Republic Day parade. The Prime Minister added that the Subhas Chandra Bose Disaster Management Awards have also been instituted. He remarked that these initiatives are not only a mark of respect to Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose but also serve as immortal sources of inspiration for our youth and future generations. Shri Modi stated that honoring these ideals and drawing inspiration from them is what fills our resolve for a developed India with ener-

gy and confidence. Shri Modi stated that a weak nation finds it difficult to achieve its goals, and therefore Netaji Subhas always dreamt of a strong nation. He remarked that in the 21st century, India too is establishing itself as a powerful and resolute nation. He highlighted that during Operation Sindoor, India struck back by entering the homes of those who inflicted wounds on the country and destroyed them. Shri Modi emphasized that India today knows how to build power, how to manage it, and how to use power. He said that following Netaji Subhas's vision of a strong India, the country is working to make the defense sector self-reliant. The Prime Minister noted that earlier India was dependent only on importing weapons from abroad, but today India's defense exports have crossed ₹23,000 crore. He added that indigenously built BrahMos and other missiles are attracting global attention.

## Vehicle-to-vehicle communication systems will help to reduce road accidents: Gadkari

(Gns). Union Minister for Road Transport and Highways Nitin Gadkari has informed the Consultative Committee of the Ministry that 30 GHz radio frequency has been allocated by the Department of Telecommunications for the development of vehicle-to-vehicle communication systems, which will help to reduce road accidents and fatalities.

The panel met under the chairmanship of Gadkari here on Thursday to address the critical issue of road safety. Harsh Malhotra and Ajay Tamta, Ministers of State for Road Transport and Highways, were also present in the meeting.

Gadkari urged members of the committee to impress upon state authorities the

importance of conducting regular MPSC meetings in their respective districts with participation from the District Collector, Police,



PWD, and other agencies concerned.

The Minister further stated that road safety considerations are being duly incorporated while finalising Detailed Project

Reports (DPRs). He directed the Regional Officers and Project Directors of MoRTH/NHAI to attend



MPSC meetings regularly and ensure suitable road safety interventions in ongoing projects.

Gadkari also informed that AI-based road safety applications would be

shared with states and UTs and requested Members to submit detailed notes on their concerns and suggestions for further examination.

During the meeting, the Minister also showcased the Road Safety Anthem, which has been translated into 22 regional languages.

He requested the Members of Parliament to promote the playing of the Road Safety Anthem in regional languages in schools, public gatherings, and other public spaces.

The Union Minister motivated all officers to continue making dedicated efforts towards building safer road infrastructure across the country and reiterated the Government's commitment to saving lives on Indian roads.

## SIR is same as NRC: Akhilesh Yadav

and facilitators. The Minister said that for the first time, India has built a holistic ecosystem that allows youth not only to dream but also to realise those dreams. "Young people today have the opportunity to choose what they wish to do, understand their inner strengths, and discover what they are truly

meant for. This is where mentorship becomes critical, not to impose, but to guide," he said.

Highlighting the shift from degree-centric thinking to skill-centric growth, Dr. Jitendra Singh said academic qualifications should not be confused with aptitude. Citing CSIR's Aroma Mission, he pointed out how thousands of young people, many without formal degrees, are earning substantial incomes by cultivating lavender and other aromatic crops. "We were once obsessed with IT alone. Today, we recognise that agriculture, traditional skills, and local strengths can generate far greater impact," he added.

## Editorial

### Planned Shift

The appointment of Nitin Nabin as the national president of the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) marks a moment that is less dramatic than it appears, yet more revealing than it seems. In Indian politics, generational change is often mistaken for ideological renewal. In fact, the two rarely travel together. At 45, Mr Nabin represents a cohort shaped by liberalisation-era aspirations, expanding urban-rural mobility, and the transformation of politics from street mobilisation to system-driven organisation, one that operates comfortably in a political ecosystem driven by data, artificial intelligence and rapid communication.

His elevation, therefore, signals not novelty, but organisational confidence. Prime Minister Narendra Modi's repeated assertion that he remains a "party worker" even after three terms at the helm of government is not merely symbolic humility. It is a reminder of how the party seeks to define itself ~ as an institution where authority is structured, transferable and larger than individual stature. This distinction matters because Indian political parties have often struggled with succession. Many have relied on charisma, lineage, or crisis to manage leadership change. The BJP, by contrast, continues to emphasise internal grooming and cadre legitimacy, projecting stability rather than transition anxiety. His rise also reflects a conscious organisational choice.

By elevating a leader without an independent national power base, the party reinforces central coherence, rewards organisational reliability, and ensures that authority flows from structure rather than personal charisma or regional mass following. Yet, youth here should not be confused with disruption. Mr Nabin does not represent a break from ideological direction. Instead, he embodies a managerial generation of politics ~ one focused on execution, message discipline and organisational coordination rather than ideological experimentation. Technology, in this framework, becomes an instrument rather than an idea. Artificial intelligence and digital outreach expand reach, but do not redefine political purpose.

The emphasis remains on continuity, not reinvention. The repeated invocation of tradition, culture and national identity further underlines this approach. Leadership may change, but the narrative framework remains intact. The generational shift is therefore tactical ~ aimed at energising party workers and preparing for sustained electoral engagement rather than signalling a philosophical pivot. For younger political entrants, the messaging is carefully calibrated. Politics is presented not as spectacle or shortcut, but as endurance ~ a marathon requiring patience, hierarchy, and long-term loyalty. This discourages impulsive ambition while reinforcing organisational discipline. At the same time, such stability carries its own challenge.

A generation raised entirely in the digital era may eventually demand politics that extends beyond symbolism and structure ~ seeking sharper accountability, governance outcomes, and economic mobility. For now, however, the leadership transition reflects confidence rather than uncertainty. The party appears less concerned with redefining itself than with proving that its political model can be reproduced across generations. In that sense, Mr Nabin's elevation is not a reset, but a relay. The baton has changed hands, but the track ~ carefully laid over decades ~ remains the same.

## POWER WOULD BE EXERCISED WITHIN AGREED LIMITS

(Gns). The international order built after World War II was never flawless, but it rested on a shared assumption: that power would be exercised within agreed limits. Alliances, institutions, and international law existed not to eliminate conflict, but to manage it. That assumption is now under visible strain. President Donald Trump's return to the White House has accelerated a shift already under way – from rule-based cooperation to raw transactional politics. What distinguishes this moment is not merely unpredictability, but an open rejection of the idea that restraint itself has value.

Power, in this worldview, needs no justification beyond national interest. In his second term, President

(Gns). Jute has long been known as the "Golden Fibre" of West Bengal, supporting the livelihoods of farmers across districts such as Murshidabad, Nadia, Hooghly and North 24 Parganas. For generations, jute cultivation has played a central role in the rural economy of the state. However, in recent years, many farmers reduced jute acreage due to rising labour costs, uncertain market prices and competition from synthetic materials. Today, jute farming is slowly witnessing a revival, driven by modern agricultural practices, improved varieties and renewed demand for eco-friendly products.

One of the most visible changes in jute cultivation is the shift in sowing methods. Traditionally, farmers broadcast jute seeds by hand, which often resulted in overcrowded plants and uneven growth. This led to poor fibre quality and additional labour for thinning. Farmers in Murshidabad

## New York’s City Hall, Zohran Mamdani raised

When on a bitterly cold January afternoon outside New York's City Hall, Zohran Mamdani raised his right hand and took the oath of office as mayor of New York City, the first Asian and Muslim mayor to do so, a universal political tradition was once again being embodied in 2026: conscience in public life. Beyond the spectacle of a victory against all odds, and the accompanying pageantry of inauguration, Mamdani in office is a moral signal in America and for those who are in awe of the American way of life.

For us in India, it became an occasion to recall another young mayor in another era, when the country was subjugated under British colonial rule: Subhas Chandra Bose when he assumed office as mayor of Calcutta (now Kolkata) in August 1930. He was barely 32 at that time, hailing from a privileged, cultured family which could trace its ancestry over 27 generations in Bengal. Subhas Chandra as mayor captured the imagination of Calcutta and Bengal; for the youth it was a call to their conscience, being unafraid of facing ruthless subjugation of colonial power.

The brutality of the Jallianwala Bagh massacre of 1919 was still fresh in their minds, nor was the partition of Bengal and the upsurge of the Swadeshi

from the jute stem, has traditionally been one of the most problematic stages of jute cultivation. Conventional water retting depends heavily on rainfall and the availability of clean water bodies, often resulting in inconsistent fibre quality.

In recent years, improved retting methods such as ribbon retting and microbial retting have been introduced in several parts of the state. These techniques reduce retting time, require less water and produce cleaner fibre with better colour and strength. Farmers adopting these methods have been able to secure higher fibre grades in the market. Market demand for jute is another encouraging sign for farmers. With increasing concern over plastic pollution, jute is gaining renewed importance as a biodegradable and sustainable alternative. Jute products are now widely used in packaging, geotextiles, handicrafts and eco-friendly consumer goods.

Government initiatives promoting natural fibres and restricting single-use plastics have further boosted demand. For jute-growing farmers in West Bengal, this shift presents new income opportunities.

Vivekananda taught Subhas that the greatest ideal was service of humanity, including service of one's country.

Ramakrishna stressed that renunciation of lust and gold was the test of a man's fitness for spiritual life. Subhas was fortunate to grow in an environment conducive to the broadening of his mind. His attitude towards Muslims in general was largely influenced by his early contacts: living in a Muslim locality, taking part in their festivals, watching his father whom Muslims looked up to as a patriarch, and having Muslim teachers and Muslim class-mates, to say nothing of devoted Muslim servants at home, wrote SA Ayer, in the introduction to 'Selected Speeches of Subhas Chandra Bose', published in 1962. Ayer was a minister in the Azad Hind Government. In Subhas's undergraduate

This approach may deliver tactical successes, but it reshapes global expectations. If the world's most powerful democracy no longer values predictability, others will follow ~ not out of admiration, but necessity. What the world is experiencing today is not a smooth transition between orders. Small and marginal farmers often lack access to modern tools, quality seeds and timely extension support. Delayed procurement and price fluctuations also discourage farmers from fully investing in jute cultivation.

To ensure the long-term sustainability of jute farming, coordinated efforts are essential. Strengthening extension services, promoting farmer training programmes, encouraging mechanization and ensuring fair and timely prices can make a significant difference. With proper support, jute can once again become a profitable and dependable crop for West Bengal's farmers. Jute farming today stands at a crucial turning point. By adopting modern practices and responding to changing market demands, farmers can improve their income while contributing to environmental sustainability. The revival of jute is not only about preserving a traditional crop but also about securing rural livelihoods and building a greener future.

was easily the most popular leader in Bengal, despite his voluntary exile in Pondicherry since 1909.

A regular reader of Sri Aurobindo's monthly journal Arya, Subhas was impressed by the mystic's deeper philosophy – how by a proper use of the different yogas one could rise step by step to the highest truth. Sri Aurobindo's simple words were a clarion call: "I should like to see some of you becoming great; great not for your own sake, but to make India great, so that she may stand up with head erect amongst the free nations of the world. Those of you who are poor and obscure – I should like to see their poverty and obscurity devoted to the service of the motherland. Work that she might prosper, suffer that she might rejoice." In his January 2026 inaugural address, Mamdani thanked his parents -"Mama and Baba"-acknowledged family "from Kampala to Delhi," and recalled taking his oath of citizenship on Pearl Street.

When he declared, "New York belongs to all who live in it," he rejected the logic that has long justified war: that difference must be governed through force. "No more will New York be a city where you can traffic in Islamophobia and win an election," is a quote echoing in the global media.

## US Deploys Record Military Force Around Iran, More in Middle East Than Past Gulf Wars Combined

(Gns). The United States has quietly positioned more military forces in the Middle East than it deployed during the First Gulf War, Second Gulf War and the Iraq War combined, marking one of the most significant escalations in regional military posture in decades.

The United States has significantly increased its military presence in the Middle East, deploying more forces than during the Gulf and Iraq Wars combined, including C-17 aircraft, various military assets, and naval power, indicating preparation for potential sustained operations, likely related to Iran.

In a span of just 36 hours, Washington deployed its 12th C-17 Globemaster aircraft to bases surrounding Iran, a rapid airlift capability designed to move massive volumes of weapons, equipment and personnel. Each aircraft can carry up to 77 tonnes of military cargo, underlining the seriousness of the operation.

Military planners say the scale and speed of the deployment point to preparation for sustained operations rather than routine deterrence.

Rapid Airlift Signals Long-Term Readiness

C-17 Globemasters are primarily used for large-scale logistics and war preparation, not symbolic shows of force. The arrival of multiple aircraft in such a



Naval power has also been reinforced, with aircraft carriers and nuclear-powered submarines operating in regional waters. Together, these assets allow the US to conduct air superiority missions, missile defence, long-range strikes and sustained maritime operations.

Military analysts note that such a comprehensive deployment is typically associated with preparation for high-intensity conflict rather than limited engagements.

## Kirari To Be Free From Waterlogging In Six Months, Situation Will Completely Change: Parvesh Verma

(Gns). The Delhi government has set a six month deadline to permanently resolve the long standing sewer overflow and waterlogging crisis in Kirari and surrounding areas of outer Delhi. Water and Public Works Department Minister Parvesh Verma on Thursday presented a white paper and a detailed master plan, promising visible on ground change before the next monsoon season.

stated that corrective work has begun to redesign sewer lines and install new pumping stations.

Verma said Delhi's infrastructure had remained limited to advertisements for nearly a decade, while residents continued to suffer.

Citing Kirari Assembly constituency as a key example, the minister said residents had endured severe hardship over the past 11 years.

"Over the last 11 years, the people of Kirari have lived in hell-like conditions. Sewer lines were laid, but their slope and technology were so flawed that dirty water started entering people's homes," Verma said.

He added that faulty planning and poor execution led to repeated sewer overflows, forcing contaminated water onto streets and into houses, especially during the monsoon.

Six Month Deadline to End Sewer Overflow Completely

The minister announced that corrective work had begun on a war footing to fix Delhi's drainage system. Faulty sewer lines are being redesigned and relaid, with new lines installed above ground level in Kirari and other affected localities.

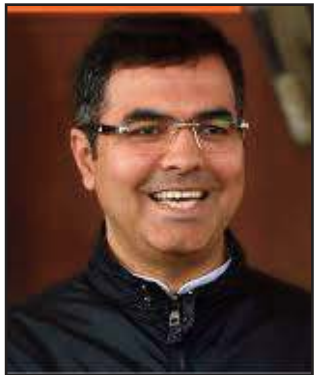
Verma said the government is confident of eliminating the overflow problem entirely. "Within the next six months, sewer overflow issues in Kirari and nearby areas will be resolved 100 percent," he said.

New pumping stations are also being installed to double drainage capacity before the monsoon arrives.

Responding to viral videos showing sewer contaminated water flooding parts of Kirari, Verma said, "There are five to six such large drains on which our department has started working. I wanted to bring all this to your attention."

'Not a Single Drop of Untreated Water Should Enter Yamuna'

Issuing strict instructions to Delhi Jal Board officials, the minister said sewage treatment capacity would be increased across the city.

Despite recurring climatic stresses, Indian agriculture particularly in rainfed regions has demonstrated notable resilience and productivity gains, underscoring the effectiveness of climate-resilient technologies, enabling policies, and institutional convergence.

He emphasised that India's climate resilience is built on an integrated ecosystem of science, policy support, technological innovation, safety nets, human capital, and coordinated implementation, with initiatives such as NICRA, the Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana, and livestock and fisheries missions collectively enhancing adaptive capacity and farmer livelihoods. Highlighting the way forward, Dr. Jat called for deeper synthesis of data, learnings, and investments into a unified national climate action platform, supported by a whole-of-government and whole-of-society approach and a centralised data ecosystem.

## First woman RVC Officer Captain Harshita to lead special Animal Contingent at R Day

Blending a lifelong passion for animals with professional expertise in veterinary science, Captain Harshita has created history by becoming the first woman officer to be inducted into the Remount Veterinary Corps (RVC) of the Indian Army. A graduate in Veterinary Science and Animal Husbandry (B.V.Sc & A.H.), she will lead the RVC contingent at the Republic Day parade, marking a significant milestone for the Corps and the Army.

For the first time, the RVC of the Indian Army, tasked with the breeding, training and care of all military animals such as horses, mules and dogs, will deploy a specialised animal contingent, underscoring

the Army's high-altitude operational requirements. The contingent will comprise Bactrian camels, Zanskari ponies, raptors, and indigenous military canines.

Speaking with the UNI, the young Captain said that joining the RVC fulfilled her childhood dream of being an army officer and being close to the animals as a veterinarian.

Hailing from Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh, the young captain is second among three siblings. "Unfortunately," she says on a lighter note. "Being the first woman officer in the Corps was indeed a moment of pride for me and my family back home. Army is a gender-neutral force and here an

officer is an officer irrespective of the gender," said the proud Contingent
