



"Amit Shah's Assam poll promise: BJP to send back infiltrators; tribal households to get cow, buffalo

Goalpara, (GNS): As a bit short. Give us five years, Assam Assembly elections near, Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Friday promised that a third consecutive BJP government would tackle infiltrators in the state and focus on the development and welfare of tribal communities.

Addressing a gathering here, Shah accused the Congress of turning Assam into a hub for infiltrators.

"The Congress turned Assam into a hub for infiltrators. If their government comes to power, infiltrators will infiltrate even within our tribal areas. You form the BJP government for the third time. Next time I come, the BJP government will selectively send back the infiltrators. All infiltrators have been identified. Time is

remove the identified infiltrators," Shah said.

Shah highlighted the BJP's focus on tribal welfare, contrasting it with Congress' record. He said that the budget allocated for the development of tribal society was Rs 25,000 crore during the Congress rule and has been increased to Rs 1.38 crore under the Narendra Modi government.

"The Congress comes here time and again to contest elections, but never once speaks about the welfare of the tribal community. 75 years had passed, but they never made a single tribal woman the President. Only PM Modi elevated our sister Droupadi Murmu to the position of the President.



During the Congress tenure, from independence until 2013, the budget for the development of tribal society was Rs 25,000 crore. PM Modi increased it to Rs 1.38 crore," the Union Home Minister said.

Shah said that the BJP will establish a large dairy in every district of Assam and provide one cow and one buffalo to every tribal house-

hold. "For tribal communities across the country, PM Modi has promoted their art, their culture, their cuisine, their attire, their music, and their dance on the world stage. This Dudhnoi River is known as the river of milk, which is why it got the name Dudhnoi. Is there even a single dairy here? Elect our candidate and send him to the

Assembly; the BJP will establish a large dairy in every district of Assam and provide one cow and one buffalo to every tribal household," he added. Meanwhile, Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, speaking at a rally in Barpeta, praised the NDA government's initiatives. "On one hand, the NDA government led by the BJP has worked to advance India's culture, India's traditions, and India's heritage; it is providing security and achieving the goal of good governance, and through service, it is working to deliver the benefits of a non-discriminatory governance plan to every village, the poor, farmers, youth, and women; NDA double-engine government has shown com-

mitment to transforming Assam's renaissance within 10 years, while on the other hand, the Congress-led government, over 60 years, promoted anarchy, riots, and infiltration in Assam, thereby obstructing security here," he added. BJP national president Nitin Nabin, speaking from Kamrup, said, "We will fight to ensure Assam gets its due. If anyone has worked to return to the people of Assam the land that was usurped and handed over to infiltrators by the Congress government of that time, it is the BJP-NDA government that has done it, the government led by Himanta Biswa Sarma has done it."

Union Minister of State (MoS) Pabitra Margherita expressed confidence in the prospects of the BJP in the

state, particularly in the Nazira constituency. "I'm not commenting on the numbers or how many seats we're going to get. But I can assure you that in this particular seat, the NDA candidate or BJP candidate, Mayur Borgohain, will definitely get the mandate and blessings from the people of Nazira with a margin of at least 30,000 votes," he said in a public rally. Expressing confidence, he further added, "In every seat, the people of Assam are showering their blessings upon us. We are confident that for the third consecutive time, we are going to form the government." The BJP released its manifesto on Tuesday, outlining 31 promises aimed at transforming Assam into a "brightest state."

On April 16th, she returned to her parents' home in Ayodhya to take her intermediate exams.

Raghav Chadha said, "I raised public issues. What harm did that do to AAP?" At the end of the video, he warned AAP that he would "come like a storm" against those who silence their voices. However, Raghav neither named any party leaders nor commented on leaving the party or his future strategy.

Meanwhile, AAP national spokesperson Anurag Dhanda said that instead of raising party issues in the House, Raghav Chadha raised the issue of making samosas cheaper at airport canteens.

Rahul challenges the Bhopal MP-MLA court summons, hearing next week

Jabalpur (GNS): Senior Congress leader Rahul Gandhi and the Shivraj Singh Chouhan family will soon face off in the Madhya Pradesh High Court. The matter involves a defamation case. Rahul Gandhi has challenged the summons issued by the MP MLA Court in the High Court. A bench headed by Justice Pramod Kumar Agarwal will hear the case in a week.

17A. The warship is equipped with the BrahMos supersonic missile, MFSTAR (radar), and a medium-range surface-to-air missile air defense system. It is also equipped with a 76mm gun, 30mm and 12.7mm close-in weapon systems, along with anti-submarine rockets and torpedoes. India's indigenous nuclear submarine, the Aridaman, was also inducted into the Navy. It is the fourth warship of the Nilgiri-class.

Pakistan to impose dung tax on cow and buffalo rearing:

Government to charge Rs 30 per animal daily opposition says this is a way to raise revenue

Lahore (GNS): Pakistan's Punjab state is now preparing to impose a "tax" on cow and buffalo rearing. According to a report in the Pakistani newspaper Daily Times, Maryam Nawaz's government may impose a daily fee of 30 Pakistani rupees per cow and buffalo.

The government is promoting this initiative as a green energy initiative. The scheme is being described as part of the "Clean Punjab" biogas program, which was launched in the state of Punjab in December 2024. Its goal is to clean waste and generate energy by converting it into biogas. Opposition parties have strongly criticized the decision, calling it a "cow dung tax." They say the move shows the government is under financial pressure and is now resorting to new methods to raise money.

The opposition claimed that the name "green energy" was merely a gimmick.



Trump's forced exit, Iran's fierce attack and Israel's ordeal

Today, in the scorching, gunpowder-smelling deserts of the Middle East, history's most dangerous script is being written, and the world stands at a juncture where the arrogance of a superpower like America appears to be crumbling before Iran's steely resolve. US President Donald Trump, who, upon assuming the White House, threatened to send Iran back to the Stone Age, now finds himself utterly trapped by Iran's unprecedented military assertiveness and unwavering missile technology. Iran has emerged as an unconquerable victor in this conflict, sending a message to the entire world that it will no longer remain on the defensive

but will adopt a policy of offensive defense, destroying the enemy in its own home. The recent Iranian missiles penetrating Tel Aviv's supposedly impenetrable security walls and the precise attacks on US bases in Jordan have proven that underestimating Iran's military power was Trump's biggest historical mistake. Iran has not only dismissed American threats but has also, using its military superiority, posed a threat to change the landscape of the war, leaving Trump completely isolated and helpless on the international stage.

Meanwhile, Trump's decision to withdraw has created a power vacuum in the Middle East, which Russia and China are eager to fill. As soon as the US military withdraws, Putin, with his military credentials, and Xi Jinping, with his

boundless economic power, will completely dominate this oil-rich region. Trump's exit opens a golden path for China, where it will emerge as the new economic and strategic power of the Middle East without firing a single shot, effectively marking the end of US global dominance. But the greatest unease, anger, and insecurity in this entire development is evident in Israel, for which Trump's exit plan is nothing less than a major diplomatic betrayal and a direct death warrant, as Israel clearly believes that a US withdrawal will leave Iran as the uncrowned and unchecked king of the entire region. Israel today feels betrayed and isolated in this war, and the historic, massive increase of \$10 billion in its military budget is enough to signal to the world that it is now prepared to enter this

world war alone. The Israeli leadership is well aware that if Trump's army leaves, enemy groups led by Iran will attack it from all sides. Therefore, defeat for it now would simply mean being wiped off the world map. Ultimately, the harsh reality today is that America's bullying has paled in comparison to Iran's powerful missiles, and Trump, having forgotten his old arrogance, is only looking for a safe return, while Israel is ready to shed every ounce of blood to defend its territory. The coming 21 days will clearly show the world how a superpower loses its footing and how the new geography of the Middle East is now being written in the bitter ink of gunpowder at the behest of Tehran rather than Washington, where Russia and China are now emerging as the new umpires.

The US-Israel-Iran war is a war that has captured the attention of the world's media. All channels are focused on the war, and the news coverage has destroyed peace—the war could have sparked thousands of conversations about the meaning of humanity. But it hasn't. In this war, the US loses troops, equipment, and even a base in the Middle East. Trump then declared that the US has won the war, but in reality, no one has. Iran should now end this war peacefully and through mutual understanding. America's history of warfare dates back to the dropping of atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945, during the final days of World War II. On August 6 and 9, 1945, the United States dropped two atomic bombs on the Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. These aerial bombings killed 150,000 to 246,000 people, most of whom were civilians. This was the first and only use of nuclear weapons in armed conflict. We live in the age of dwarfs, not leaders. Before and immediately after World War II, the world witnessed towering figures like Mahatma Gandhi, Martin Luther King, and Nelson Mandela, whose actions, appeals, and pleas carried immense weight and resonated worldwide.

Central Vista transplantation survival rate at 57%

New Delhi ,(GNS):

Only 57% of trees transplanted for the Central Vista redevelopment project in Delhi have survived, govt informed Lok Sabha on Thursday.

In a written reply, housing and urban affairs ministry told the LS that 3,609 trees were transplanted as part of the project and 1,545 of these died post-transplantation.

Data provided by the ministry in response to a question by TMC MP Mahua Moitra showed that from the new Parliament building site, 402 trees were transplanted to NTPC Eco Park in Badarpur and the Parliament House complex, while 38 trees from General Pool Office Accommodation (GPOA-2) were shifted to the Yamuna riverbank.

Another 1,734 trees from the



Common Central Secretariat buildings 1, 2 and 3 were relocated to NTPC Eco Park. Similarly, 390 trees from the Vice President's Enclave were transplanted to NTPC Eco Park and within the enclave area. On the expenditure incurred on transplantation and afforestation over the years, the ministry said Rs 35.9 lakh was spent in 2023-24 and Rs 122.9 lakh in 2024-25. The allocation saw a rise to Rs 370.3 lakh in 2025-26.

Rajya Sabha Secretariat denies AAP MP Raghav Chadha's request to speak in House



New Delhi ,(GNS): The Rajya Sabha Secretariat on Thursday refused Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) MP Raghav Chadha's request to speak on the Jan Vishwas Amendment Bill, citing that no time had been allocated to him by the party, sources told news agency Media. The move comes after AAP sent an official letter to the Rajya Sabha Secretariat stating that Ashok Kumar Mittal would be the party's new deputy leader in the Upper House, replacing Chadha.

Mittal, a Rajya Sabha MP from Punjab, was elected in April 2022. Since then, he has been a member of several parliamentary committees, including the Committee on Defence and the Committee on Finance. In February 2026, he became a member of the India-USA Parliamentary Friendship Group.

He was also part of an all-party delegation, led by Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK) MP Kanimozhi, which visited Russia, Latvia, Slovenia, Greece, and Spain after the Pahalgam terror attack last year. Chadha, also elected to the Rajya Sabha in April 2022, has raised multiple public issues in Parliament. Last month, he highlighted the practice of "sarpanch pati" or "panchayat pati," where women elected to reserved Panchayat seats often serve as figureheads while real power is exercised by male relatives. He urged the government to ensure that women representatives in local bodies can exercise genuine authority as intended under the 73rd Constitutional Amendment.

He has also raised the issue of menstrual hygiene, stating: "It is a matter of health, education and equality, which affects over 35 crore women and girls in India. If a girl misses school because there are no sanitary pads, water, and privacy, it is not her personal problem but a collective failure. Society has turned a biological fact into a social taboo." Earlier this year, amid the gig workers' agitation, Chadha spent a day as a delivery partner to understand firsthand the pressures and challenges associated with the job.

HC lawyers oppose Saturday sittings

New Delhi ,(GNS): In protest against the decision of Delhi high court to hold court every first and third Saturday of the month, the local bar association on Thursday called upon lawyers to abstain from work.

Under Chief Justice DK Upadhyaya, the HC administration had earlier this year declared these two Saturdays every month as court sitting days, with the state's aim to increase disposal of matters, particularly of cases that have been pending for long. Signalling its intent, Delhi HC Bar Association came out with a notice that on March 27, saying it unanimously resolved to abstain from work on the two working Saturdays, after the high court administration did not reconsider its decision despite multiple representations.

The Bar body said the resolution was taken after noting that multiple representations had been made to HC seeking reconsideration of the notification dated Jan15



but no change had been made.

"As such, all members of Delhi High Court Bar Association are requested to co-operate and abstain from work on the 1st and 3rd Saturdays of every month, starting from April 4. Further, it is informed that proxy counsels shall be designated for each court on these days," the notice said.

It added that several members of the Bar had flagged "serious practical difficulties" arising from HC holding sittings on Saturday, as it clashed with lawyers' cases and

appearances before tribunals, arbitrations, mediation proceedings and courts outside Delhi. The notice further said that the revised schedule adversely impacts preparation time, client conferences and the overall professional efficiency of advocates, who need time beyond court hearings to prepare their briefs and arguments.

Three held as illegal LPG refilling racket busted in Palam village, 45 cylinders seized

New Delhi ,(GNS): Delhi Police has busted an illegal LPG storage and refilling racket operating from a residential plot in southwest Delhi's Palam Village, arresting three persons and seizing 45 domestic gas cylinders along with refilling equipment.

The accused-Anaar Singh from Najafgarh, Satyaveer of Dabri and Vikas Kumar

of Palam were apprehended during a raid on March 28 following a tip-off about illegal storage at a vacant plot near Adarsh Gali. DCP (southwest) Amit Goel said police found a tandoor loaded with cylinders. "Gas was being illegally transferred from one cylinder to another using nozzles and a weighing machine, without any safety measures," he said.

Biscuits, cakes instead of hot meals: Row at Miranda House after gas advisory blamed for menu tweaks

New Delhi ,(GNS):

Biscuits and cakes instead of cheela and macaroni with evening tea; sandwiches replacing parathas, pav bhaji and chole bhature; and rotis only during dinner - these are among the changes introduced at the hostel mess of Miranda House, which led to protests on the campus of the premier institute on Wednesday evening.

Internal messages from the hostel mess secretary, shared with residents on a WhatsApp group, show that the menu has been scaled down over the past few days.

"Due to the worsening situation in the Gulf, there is currently a limited supply of gas from GAIL. Because of this, food items that require more gas to prepare - such as aloo fry, kadhi and parathas - will not be provided for the time being," according to a message.

Another notice reads: "In teashare (evening snack time), food will be prepared in the mess only once a week. On the remaining days, packaged food will be provided. Roti will be served only during dinner. All meals will consist of simple dishes that require less gas. This arrangement will remain in effect until further notice." A third communication explains the constraints. "Parathas have been temporarily removed from the breakfast



menu. Instead, toasted bread and sandwiches will be provided. For items like chicken biryani, a lot of vegetables need to be fried, which is not possible with low gas pressure. Pav requires butter toasting using around eight burners, which is not feasible right now."

The college administration, however, denied that there has been any arbitrary cut in food services, stating that changes were made in consultation with students following an advisory from IGL to reduce gas consumption by 20%. IGL officials said on Thursday that there was no disruption in supply to educational institutions, hostels, hospitals and canteens, and that supply is likely to remain unaffected.

In the second week of March, an IGL communication to colleges and other industrial and commercial PNG consumers had advised them to maintain gas usage at 80% of the average consumption in the previous six months. This followed a notification issued by the Centre, prioritising domestic gas supply, followed by the fertiliser sector and then industrial and commercial con-

sumers.

Principal Bijayalaxmi Nanda said she did not receive any formal complaint and that the authorities had engaged with protesting students, assuring them their concerns would be addressed. "The mess menu is decided by the students themselves. We ensure they get proper nutritious food. The college is not facing any kind of crisis in gas supply," she said. Students, however, said that typical evening "teashare" items, such as aloo tikki, pakoda, kachori, chowmein and macaroni have largely been replaced by packaged food. Some claimed that following the protest, meals temporarily improved on Thursday, with items like rajma chawal and roti served at lunch. Around 300 students reside at the Miranda House hostel. Responding to the allegations, bursar and hostel committee member Nandini Dutta said the changes in the menu were made after consultation with students and were not imposed on them.

"We received an advisory to restrict PNG usage to 80% of the last six months' consumption. Based on that, and after discussion with the students, some adjustments were made," she said. On packaged food being served, she said it was introduced with students' consent and "is not provided every day".

25-year-old man stabbed to death at girlfriend's home in Faridabad

New Delhi ,(GNS): A 25-year-old man who had come to meet his girlfriend at her house in Roshan Nagar, Faridabad was stabbed to death on Wednesday night. The police have arrested five accused including a minor within hours of the incident.

The arrested accused were identified as Prince, Roshan, Rahul, residents of Jaitpur in Delhi and Harsh, resident of Arpan Vihar, Delhi and one minor. The main accused identified as Aman is still on large.

The deceased was identified as Manas Rai, a resident of Ekta Vihar, Jaitpur in Delhi.

According to the complaint filed by Rajkumar, the father of the deceased, his son was acquainted with a girl living in Roshan Nagar. On April 1, around 10:00 pm, his son along with his friend Harsh went to



meet the girl at her home in Roshan Nagar. The girl's father was also at home.

"While they were talking, the girl's younger sister came home from outside with some acquaintances Aman, Prince, Roshan, Rahul, Harsh and others. Aman took a knife from his pocket and attacked Manas Rai. My son's friend Harsh tried to stop the attack with his hand, injuring

him in the hand. Aman then stabbed my son again in the stomach, and the others assaulted him and Harsh with kicks, punches and slaps. My son died while undergoing treatment at Safdarjung Hospital," added the father of the deceased. Following the complaint, an FIR was registered at the Palla police station and five accused were arrested on Thursday while the main accused Aman is still on the run.

"Initial investigation revealed that the accused Aman had a previous dispute with the deceased Manas Rai. On the night of April 1, Aman reached Roshan Nagar with his friends, where he stabbed Manas Rai in the stomach. We are questioning the arrested accused and raids are being conducted to nab the main accused," said a spokesperson of the Faridabad police.

Delhi Assembly marks Mahavir Jayanti, stresses non-violence



New Delhi ,(GNS): The Delhi Legislative Assembly on Thursday hosted a commemorative programme, "Bhagwan Mahavir Gunanuvad", to mark the 2625th birth anniversary of Lord Mahavira, with leaders emphasising the relevance of his teachings in contemporary society.

Addressing the gathering, Speaker Vijender Gupta invoked the principle of "Seva Paramo Dharma", stating that selfless service must guide public life and governance. He described Mahavira's philosophy of Anekantavada, the mul-

tiplicity of truth, as a cornerstone of democratic values, stressing that respect for differing viewpoints strengthens democracy.

Chief Minister Rekha Gupta highlighted the enduring relevance of non-violence, restraint and compassion, calling them essential in a world facing growing unrest. "Lord Mahavir's path of non-violence and compassion is not just a religious teaching, but a practical roadmap for global peace," she said, urging people to adopt self-discipline and inner restraint in daily life.

Tobacco sold openly outside Delhi government hospitals



New Delhi , Agency: Just outside the gates of some of Delhi's largest government hospitals, small roadside vendors openly sell cigarettes, pan masala and chewing tobacco, a sight that sits uneasily alongside health institutions meant for healing. At Lok Nayak Jai Prakash (LNJP) Hospital near Delhi Gate and at Lal Bahadur Shastri Hospital in Mayur Vihar Phase-3 such shops can be spotted within a short walking distance of the main entrances, catering to attendants, visitors and, at times, patients themselves.

In several instances, vendors were seen displaying sachets of pan masala and tobacco products in full public view, even as anti-tobacco warnings remain prominently pasted within hospital premises.

Attendants and visitors offered mixed reactions. While some described the shops as a matter of convenience during long hours of waiting at hospitals, others questioned their presence so close to health-care facilities. "You come here for treatment, and the first thing you see outside is tobacco being sold," said a visitor at LNJP Hospital, pointing to a stall near the gate.

Vendors, on their part, maintained that they have been operating in these areas for years. "There is regular demand. People come here buy cigarettes or pan masala," said one shopkeeper near LNJP Hospital, adding that no authority had asked him to shut shop so far.

Delhi leaders offer prayers on Hanuman Janmotsav

New Delhi ,(GNS): Political leaders across the Capital participated in religious ceremonies on the occasion of Hanuman Janmotsav on Thursday, offering prayers and extending greetings while underlining the values of service, unity and social harmony.

Chief Minister Rekha Gupta visited the 108-ft Shri Sankat Mochan Dham Temple in Karol Bagh, where she joined devotees in reciting the Hanuman Chalisa and offered prayers for the well-being and prosperity of the people of Delhi. Addressing devotees, she described Lord Hanuman as a symbol of "service, dedication, courage and unwavering commitment," adding that such occasions help foster positive energy, unity and spiritual awareness in society. Social Welfare Minister Ravindra Indraj Singh attended several religious and cultural programmes across his Bawana constituency, including Shahbad Daultpur, Auchandi, Qutubgarh and Krishna Vihar. Participating in havans, bhajan sandhyas and Sundarkand recitals, he said Lord Hanuman's life reflects the values of "selfless service, firm faith and commitment to public welfare," urging people to imbibe these ideals in daily life. In Shahbad Daultpur, the minister offered prayers and sought blessings, while in other areas he interacted with devotees and took part in distribution of prasad. He also extended greetings to residents, stating that such events strengthen social cohesion and collective responsibility. Delhi BJP president Virendra Sachdeva also visited several temples across the city, including the historic Hanuman temple in Chandni Chowk and another in Connaught Place.

Stubble burning sees 90% fall, but 'toxic cocktail' keeps Delhi air choked

New Delhi ,(GNS): On Tuesday, in the Rajya Sabha, the Central government placed a paradox that now redefines pollution story. Stubble burning, long seen as the seasonal villain, has dropped sharply. Yet the air remains stubbornly toxic. The government's own reply, tabled in response to a question by C Ve Shanmugam, quietly shifted the focus away from stubble burning to a far more complex web of causes.

Environment minister Kirti Vardhan Singh stated, "Air pollution is a collective result of high levels of anthropogenic activity across multiple sectors." It was a plain admission, but one that reframed the pollution debate, especially for Delhi-NCR. Vehicular emissions, industrial discharge, construction and demolition dust, road dust, biomass burning, and municipal solid waste burning now sit together in what the government described as a toxic cocktail. Weather, too, plays its part.



During winter, lower temperatures, reduced mixing heights, temperature inversion, and stagnant winds trap pollutants close to the ground, allowing these to accumulate across the region.

The numbers on stubble burning suggest a success story, at least in isolation. Punjab and Haryana together recorded a 90 per cent reduction in fire incidents during

the 2025 paddy harvesting season compared to 2022. The government acknowledged that stubble burning is "episodic but significant." But it stopped short of calling the problem solved. The implication was harder to ignore. Even with 90% reduction in stubble burning cases, the air remains toxic.

Behind this shift lies a sustained push on crop residue

management. Since 2018-19, Rs 4,233.84 crore has been released under a Central scheme. Over 3.53 lakh machines have been distributed, and more than 43,535 custom hiring centres set up across several states. Small and marginal farmers have been allowed to access these machines rent-free under a government direction. Yet the question lingers quietly. Whether the benefits are reaching those who burn out of compulsion remains uncertain.

The minister's response then moved to roads. From November 1, 2025, the entry of BS-3 and older commercial goods vehicles into Delhi has been banned. From November 2026, only CNG, electric, or BS-VI diesel buses will be allowed. Fleet operators, aggregators, and delivery services have already been barred from adding new petrol or diesel vehicles from January 1, 2026. At present,

5,340 CNG and electric buses are running in Delhi, including 3,535 electric ones. More are planned under the PM e-DRIVE scheme.

Industry and construction, long seen as difficult sectors to regulate, are now under tighter scrutiny. Of the 240 industrial areas in Delhi-NCR, 224 are connected to piped natural gas. Red-category industries are being monitored through Online Continuous Emission Monitoring Systems. Construction sites above 500 square metres must now register, install pollution monitors, conduct fortnightly audits, and allow remote access.

The enforcement framework has also been strengthened. The graded response action plan was revised in November 2025, allowing restrictions to be triggered even before pollution levels breach thresholds, based on forecasts.

Ghaziabad mining row: NGT flags gap in probe

New Delhi ,(GNS): The National Green Tribunal (NGT), Principal Bench, New Delhi, on Thursday issued directions in a case concerning alleged illegal mining activities in Ghaziabad, Uttar Pradesh.

The tribunal directed the District Task Force, Ghaziabad to conduct a detailed site inspection and submit a report addressing weather illegal mining has been carried out at the lease site. The report details places where mining is occurring in the district and details of the mining pit (dimensions, origin and responsibility).

The tribunal noted that it had earlier restrained mining activities at the site on January 29, 2026. This order was challenged before the Supreme Court, but the appeal was dismissed on February 26, 2026, allowing NGT proceedings to continue.

NGT also raised serious



concerns regarding the fairness of the police investigation, particularly registration of FIR against "unknown persons" despite mining occurring within a lease area, lack of clarity on who created the mining pit and whether mining was permissible.

It directed the Commissioner of Police, Ghaziabad to file a detailed affidavit on the progress of the investigation, identification of persons involved, details of the JCB owner and driver. The matter is listed for further hearing on April 9, 2026.

MCD suspends former deputy commissioner after CBI arrest

New Delhi ,(GNS): Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD) on Thursday suspended the former deputy commissioner of Shahdara North Zone, Lt Col Abhishek Kumar Mishra, three days after the CBI arrested him for allegedly accepting a Rs 4 lakh bribe. Along with this, MCD has also cancelled Mishra's six-day leave for a trip to Vietnam.

MCD has assigned the tax assessor and collector, Mamta Yadav, IAS, to an additional responsibility as deputy commissioner of this zone. Yadav is a 2021 batch IAS officer. She has prior experience of working as deputy commissioner in Keshavpuram and City SP Zone.

Additionally, MCD has given ITS Mohit Bansal the additional responsibility of deputy commissioner of



Keshavpuram Zone. He holds the responsibility of IT director.

"For the smooth functioning of the MCD, the work amongst the officers in MCD is allocated with immediate effect to the above officials till further orders are issued," states the official order issued on Thursday by the director (personnel).

As highlighted, the initiative "contributes to advancing research in an insightful understanding the mechanism of antibiotic and heavy metal resistance: emergence, maintenance and spread among bacteria from natural environments as well clinical settings, and screening of natural and synthetic chemical compounds/ formulations for their antimicrobial activities against MDR pathogens, thereby reinforcing Jamia Millia Islamia's commitment to high impact, translational science that addresses critical public health challenges through

innovation and collaborative excellence."

By integrating fundamental research with practical applications, the university aims to bridge laboratory findings with real-world healthcare needs. The focus on collaboration and innovation further underscores its commitment to tackling antimicrobial resistance, an issue increasingly recognized as a global health emergency.

Experts believe that such research efforts are crucial not only for developing new treatment strategies but also for informing policies and practices that can curb the spread of resistant bacteria.
